



Miriam Mas — **Embodying the Spirit of Christmas**

Through no fault of her own, Mas has burst into the Valley arts limelight. That's not strictly true. It **The Backstory** is her fault that she paints irresistibly heartwarming paintings of familiar and beloved creatures and objects. Her paintings transform her modest home into a welcoming oasis of beauty and serenity. Each canvas celebrates our connection to the natural world and the other living creatures with whom we share this Mother Earth. From a chickadee on

a snow-sprinkled branch to a quartet of cows munching contentedly, Mas renders their images with a palpable enjoyment of their existence. Her paintings of dogs bear genuine witness to the key role they continue to play in her life. Whether it's a little girl with her doll or a chocolate cupcake on a plate, Mas' tender portraits make your heart smile.

We have choices, and Mas chooses to use her paintings to express her gratitude and joy for being alive, for being in Canada, and for arriving at a point where she is doing what she loves. She loves beauty — "the kind of beauty that touches one's heart." She has always loved painting since her parents gave her a basic oil painting kit many years ago, but she only started painting seriously in 2015 while

recuperating from a severe work-related back injury. Facebook, and stopped giving them away for free when viewers started asking how much they cost. Miriam signed up for a local Christmas craft show, and shortly after that was invited to join the North Grenville Arts Guild by former president and now good friend Reinder Kuntz. At their 2018 show, visitors chose her as their favourite artist. (I notice that one of her paintings appears on the Guild's November Newsletter.)

Again, I notice on their website that Mas' paintings are selling very well. I'm certain that their appeal is the direct consequence of what drives her to paint: "...painting has a strange magic. It is like a beautiful poem or rhyme that you can always look at and that never tires you. I love the excitement I feel every single time I am about to start a new painting. Sometimes I feel the same anticipation as a child waiting to get up on Christmas morning." Each of her paintings is a gift that keeps on giving.

Born in Barcelona, Spain, the youngest of five children, Miriam came to Canada in 1988. After completing an ESL course (English as a Second Language, although it was Miriam's third — after Catalan and Spanish), she landed a job in the HR department of Canada Post and was handed a large stack of résumés to assess. Although she did not have the prerequisite



qualifications, she persuaded an Algonquin professor She began posting photos of her small works on to let her enroll in his Interactive Multimedia class. Next, a wonderful Human Resources manager at Nortel hired her as a graphics designer, even though Mas disclosed that she was three months pregnant.

She worked for Nortel as a telecommuter while raising her first two children, but her near-death experience due to disseminated intravascular coagulation when delivering her third child changed her life. "The team at the Civic Hospital saved my life. The experience left me feeling that there was still Mas is particularly grateful for the generous something important left for me to do in this life."



dogs for people with mobility-related disabilities. These service dogs help people in wheelchairs in a multitude of practical ways — by retrieving objects out of reach, opening and closing doors, taking socks off, barking for help, etc. — that provide a better quality of life by promoting independence. Perhaps the dogs' biggest accomplishment is growing hearts bigger through their companionship and unconditional love.

After her 23-year marriage ended in divorce, Miriam renewed acquaintance with someone with whom she had shared a special connection more than thirty years earlier. She sponsored Peter Vaz to come to Canada in 2013, but he had to return to Barcelona for medical reasons in 2015, and it took until early 2019 for his permanent residency to be approved. Fortunately he is now by her side, incredibly supportive, and available to ensure that she doesn't impair her own

health by staying up all night to paint.

After fifteen years of dedicating her life to helping people with mobility challenges, her back injury in 2015 forced her to take a break. In a very real way, her passion for art helped her overcome her own mobility issues, and continues to guide her into a future replete with oil paintings and — you guessed it — dogs!

There is no mistaking her special relationship with dogs. Miriam Mas' paintings of "Man's" best friend are illuminated by her love of the incredible animals that she continues to work with. Mas has just been nominated a finalist for CNIB Foundation's 2019 Employee of the Year award. Her full-time job as Lead of the Buddy Dog Program entails preparing and placing Buddy Dogs with visually impaired children between the ages of 7 and 16. In April she led CNIB's launch of its Buddy Dog program, and today there are seven children living with sight loss across Canada whose lives are enriched daily by a furry friend. She is also the administrator for the entire CNIB Guide Dogs Team. Their website

states "...she ensures all of our programs run smoothly."

Thinking back over Mas' successes in forging a new life for herself in Canada, I ask her how she did it. Her response rings true: "If I believe that something is really right for me, I visualize it and life directs me towards how it can become a reality." Watching her in her home with the two dogs she is training to be Buddy Dogs is a great example. When I showed up to take her photo, the loving portrait of two of the puppies in the CNIB Guide Dog program that she was working on took my breath away (I think it was my heart expanding). Once the painting is completed she will donate it to CNIB Guide Dogs for a Gala Fundraiser in Regina taking place in January.




last day students will perform a short routine in front of a live audience.

> a minimum number of students in order to run, so the organizers will confirm ten days before the start date.



This is followed by *Once in Royal David's City as* the choirs process down the aisle. The Reverend Kenneth Davis then bids the congregation to "hear the message of the angels and, in heart and mind to go unto Bethlehem and see the babe lying in a manger", and "to pray to God for the needs of the whole world and all his people; and for peace upon the earth".





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

Solve the Mystery! Save Christmas!

So I've seen the November 24 rehearsal of Who Stole Christmas from Mississippi Mills and I can tell you this: Theodor Robert Geisel will chuckle in his grave to think we will see his creations on Almonte's Main Street. In fact, every last one of us MissMillians will be chuckling at Rob and Kris Riendeau's hilarious millennial repurposing of Geisel's original bad boys, namely, Thing One, Thing Two and the infamous Grinch channelling that wantonly destructive child we all carry within: the Cat in the Hat.

More than 60 years after Geisel, aka Dr. Seuss, published *The Cat in the Hat* and *How the Grinch Stole Christmas*, writer Rob Riendeau has written the almost-impossible: an even funnier Dr. Seuss aimed at boomers, gen a, b, c and x, y and z and every insta- and inter-person in between. Imagine Seuss on Red Bull writing for SNL and you'll have some idea of Rob's comedy.

This hour has 22 laughs a minute!

A great script is one thing, but bringing that script to life on stage is a whole other thing. And that's where Rob's creative and peripatetic purple-haired partner Kris comes into play. All I can say is Kris (and her hair) shines in her role as co-conspirator and hands-on director of Rob's comedic brilliance; she even joined the dancers on stage during the big heel-and-toe number to show them how it's done!

Then there's the cast — Noreen Young's puppets working hand-in-hand with humans wearing Ingrid Hamster's creations — and the behind-the-scenes movers and

shakers, a "who's who-ville" of Mississippi Mills, every one unveiling comedic talent most of us wouldn't have a clue about otherwise. For more about that, see Heather Phaneuf's rollicking article in the November issue of the Humm.

be chuckling at Rob and Kris Riendeau's Believe it or not, the script is Rob's first hilarious millennial repurposing of Geisel's attempt at writing comedy, springing *ex* original bad boys, namely, Thing One, Thing Two and the infamous Grinch channelling Kris by surprise with its chaotic hilarity.

"Rob's a very funny guy, but even I had no idea he could sit down and turn out a full-length script," explains Kris. "He did take a Learning in Almonte writing course called 'Good Idea to a Good Read', which helped him get going with this project. And over the spring and summer we workshopped some of the early scenes with many of the actors who are in the show, so that helped with some of the character development. But mostly it was a truly hidden talent!"

True to the spirit of Geisel's times and iconoclasm (Geisel was a political cartoonist before he turned to kidlit) the irrepressible Riendeau One and Riendeau Two have married social commentary and political satire to create a mix bubbling over with ribald fun.

"This is the first show that Rob and I are producing all on our own with no outside funding," Kris tells me. "We are fronting all the costs and hoping we won't lose money, so we are relying on good ticket sales. The show is light-hearted and funny, but it's also our love letter to this community that we have called home for thirty years."

Ed Lawrence (who plays a special role I've promised not to reveal and also adds his impressive baritone to the show) says, "I've been especially bowled over by the musicians. One third of the Arrogant Worms (the inimitable Mike McCormick), one half of the Ragged Flowers, and every one of the pitch-perfect Jingle Belles. They all make this show hum. This kind of talent should make the heart of our community grow two sizes bigger!"

Tove Hunding, cast member and a regular on the Almonte Town Hall stage, agrees. "It takes a community to support local talent and keep local live theatre alive. Our very own Jingle Belles singing Bonnie Vallentyne's wonderfully loony lyrics promote local businesses who in turn are generously supporting

United Way East Ontario. By supporting us, our audience is supporting those in need. Together, we're delivering Rob's and Kris's first on-stage 'baby,' a Christmas gift that will keep on giving!"

I've read the script and watched the cast live it on stage and I kid you not, if *Who Stole Christmas from Mississippi Mills* doesn't get you chuckling, then your funny bone must be at least two sizes too small.

"Bring a box of tissues," advises Ed. "You'll be laughing so hard you'll be crying."

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

Giving the Gift of Real Estate

Buy Wild Land for your Friends and Relatives!

Starting to think about Christmas shopping? This year keep it simple 3. Help the **Nature Conservancy of Canada** buy — give the gift of life. Be the first person to give your friend or family member a home for a wild turtle, frog or songbird!

Here are three local initiatives where you can give the gift of land — and a fourth if you would like your gift to be somewhere warm with even more birds:

- 1. Help **Ontario Nature** buy a new nature reserve near Gananoque, Ontario. This reserve will protect rare species like Cerulean warblers, flooded jellyskin lichen and gray ratsnakes. And as a bonus, this land expands a corridor used by wolves and moose. The cost is \$375 for one acre, \$190 for half an acre <ontarionature.org/gananoque>.
- 2. Help the Mississippi Madawaska Land Trust protect wild land in perpetuity. MMLT is protecting wild land in eastern Ontario. Their properties provide wild places for species including Blanding's turtles, scarlet tanagers, gray tree frogs and flying squirrels. More properties will be added soon. The MMLT Sustainability Fund provides money to protect existing acreage, while the Land Acquisition Fund provides money for, well, land acquisition. Help them get started on a new property. If you have land you would like to see preserved in a wild state forever, consider getting in touch with MMLT and discussing a direct donation or an conservation easement on the property <mmlt.ca>.
- a new nature reserve in Prince Edward County on the north shore of Lake Ontario. This reserve at Ostrander Point will protect rare coastal habitats including alvars as well as nesting areas for whip-poor-wills and many migratory birds. The cost is \$184 for 1000 square feet <natureconservancy.ca>.
- Help the Rainforest Trust buy Montane Cloud Forest in South America. Expand the El Dorado nature reserve on the Caribbean shore of Columbia. It has large numbers of rare species including a small rodent called the Santa Marta Toro and the Santa Marta harlequin frog. Rainforest Trust protects land through designations, purchases and land titling to local conservation groups and indigenous communities. Every project is tailored to the needs of that site. Their cost is \$77 per acre <rainforesttrust.org>. This year give a wild home for a wild creature! Cathy Keddy

David Taylor, Quilter

"Love What You Do and Be Willing to Learn"

David Taylor is a quilter, just a quilter. That's what he calls himself... them up, large grayscale, and then began his magic; but when you look at his work and talk to those who learn from him, on each picture — some dogs, some birds, a cat, it's clear he's not "just a quilter."

He's fun, sharp, sarcastic (wickedly so), addresses everyone by "Sister", is passionate about his job, and makes money by quilting.

Not many people do. Early on, quilting was not something he in the body of the bird or horse. I pat the horse, liked or even wanted to do. But when he found out how much quilts could sell for, he settled in, developed a unique David Taylor style, and quilting became his job.

The money, it seems, is well deserved — before he even finishes a quilt, it's sold. He can't keep his quilts, they go quickly. "They usually sell before I'm done with them... because I'm kind of popular," he says, grinning unapologetically. "People love my work. I've done quite well... I must say," he grins again, blue eyes snapping. This from a man who said he'd never hand-appliqué, but finds that's all he does.

Ten women have come to his recent workshop in North Gower. They set up their machines, two to a station, and for five days listen, learn and appliqué. The workshop isn't cheap — Taylor's reputation is wide reaching — but not one hesitated when it came to paying, according to Lynn Mills, who invited Taylor to present the workshop. Once accepted, each quilter submitted a picture to Taylor. He blew

an owl — he drew shapes. The shapes matched the structure of the animal.

"I don't draw by colour, I draw by the structure know how that horse feels. As you pet and follow the muscles and bones in the horse, that's the way I draw the lines — by the way that feels to me. Then the viewer will know how it feels."

scoffs a bit. "Just the picture, sister! I can just pet that picture to know how that feels! I want to be that bird, know what he ate, where he's going, what he's painstakingly small. One participant's quilt has 310 doing. If I don't know that, how's the viewer going pieces; others have 180 and 260 pieces. But Taylor to know it? I know it because I know that little bird.

Silence. He looks at you, making his point... and then emphasizes his point. "It's more than art. It's art to feel."

Taylor is 56; he started sewing at eight and started making his own clothes at 10. He loves fabric, and urges his students to buy, buy, buy.

The first quilt he worked on sold at a charity auction for \$25,000; his inclination from that point

was to approach quilting from the business end... Does he catch the bird or squirrel to pet it? He and he has. He calls his style "jigsaw puzzle appliqué" and his classes are pictorial appliqué classes.

> The piecework the students in his workshop do is has no doubt that the quilters will finish. "This is expensive. If they put the money in, they'll finish it."

> Two other things Taylor is certain of: love what you do and be willing to learn, and you don't have to know how to draw (but you have to want to).

> Taylor will not be back in Canada for a while, but avid quilters might be able to find workshops in nearby States. Events and dates are on his website at <davidtaylorquilts.com>.







Ageless Migration Fund

Building on the success of the Community Alliance for Refugee Resettlement (CARR) project, the Perth and District Community Foundation (PDCF), has established the Ageless Migration Fund, in cooperation with the CARR. The success of the project is a tribute to the hard work of volunteers, donors and the local community, and the new Ageless Migration Fund is being launched in their honour. To recognize these efforts, fibre artist Robynne Cole has gifted her award-winning artwork entitled Ageless Migration to the Perth and District Community Foundation and through them to the Community Alliance for Refugee Resettlement.



cupboards and finding only a can of "Who Hash". Better than nothing, but hardly festive. So why Mississippi Mills? And what can be done? Is it possible that part of the problem is simply malnutrition and that the growth of hearts is just a matter of properly presented calories?

A solution to antisocial behavior is supported by some evidence:

Punitive justice is not an efficient mechanism for behavior modification. Puddings, on the other hand, have a tradition of producing somewhat anergic contentment and feelings of well-being. They are part of many festive traditions and play an important and underappreciated role in caulking draughty gaps in our social interactions. That is one of the reasons the other hand (the one holding pudding) is sticky. We press on. Antisocial behavior may be a cry of distress caused by inadequate nutrition. Weetabix advises the residents of Mississippi Mills to take prompt remedial action which can deliver significant benefits in many other ways. Make puddings! Distribute puddings! Eat puddings!

But wait — what is a pudding and what are the properties that distinguish puddings? The star dish of supper on Robert Burns Day (January 25 in 2020) is haggis. Burns' Ode to a Haggis says it all: ".... Great chieftain o the puddin'-race! Aboon them a' ye tak your place." Skeptics may become converts if they can manage to get a taste of a well-made haggis. Haggis may not be calming, particularly if accompanied by the sounds of bagpipes; maybe it is the meat. There are many varieties of pudding-cake; but no matter how well crafted, a delicate confection with refined flavours and crunch does not have pudding's soul-satisfying capacity to induce feelings of well-being.

Recipes are devoted to the transformation of bread into puddings — all add significant amounts of sugar and fat. Some incorporate fruits or jams — but all avoid a greasy texture while loading as much sugar and fat as possible into the smallest space. Puddings are not light!


And so, back to our green marauder — clearly what he kneads is a pudding. It has been said that he subsists on "sawdust and potatoes". Taking a trusty rip-saw in hand, Weetabix set to making sawdust from a block of parmesan cheese and went in search guidance for a potato pudding. The simplest required a bit of butter and an egg as well. A boiled and mashed potato with butter and egg plus parmesan sawdust is not bad... but lacks a true pudding feel. Push the boundaries further. Add a bit more butter, sugar, flour, eggs and cream to the potato base, whip it and flavour with some vanilla, and a more generous amount of parmesan sawdust. Spirit Seeds

A Celebration of Indigenous Beadwork

Bay areas, the Eastern Woodlands women of the Anishinaabe and Haudenosaunee peoples were embroidering and beading storied and useful items. The women fabricated their designs with moosehair, porcupine quills, bits of shell, seeds; whatever was at hand to tell the story, whatever would be useful in celebration, thanksgiving, and trade with others. *Spirit Seeds*, the new exhibition at the Mississippi Valley Textile Museum, displays a good lot of this continuing history and beauty in eight display cases.

When the Europeans arrived they were looking for wealth, especially for valuable furs much in demand in Europe. As a medium of exchange, the Europeans brought buckets of glass beads to trade for fur.

Were glass beads a valuable commodity in the Woodlands? Yes, very much so. Not only is glass light-refractive and col-

ourful, beads have holes — perfect for threading. contemporary indigenous artists working today in What could be more wonderful! From the earliest days of the fur trade, curator Naomi Smith notes, glass beads have been called "spirit seeds." So are they today in a number of indigenous languages.

The exhibition includes a display of a number of purses, satchels and bags. In one case are thirteen embroidered caps, of the sort known in the 19th century as "smoking caps" or even as "thinking caps." Some of the caps are small enough for a child's head. In Victorian times, they were popular indoor wear to keep a man's or boy's head warm. The ones shown here were made for sale by the Mohawk, Seneca, and Tuscarora between 1840 and 1890.

and non-indigenous, spent many hours sewing. A pincushion was always useful to have at hand. Pincushions stuffed with emery sand and sawdust kept needles sharp, and were popular sale items, too. Often enough, there was something more to their design — a bit of talismanic grace. In the exhibition more details at <mvtm.ca>. we see a number of beaded strawberry emeries. The

Long before the Scots, French and English fur traders indigenous women who made these pincushions arrived in the St. Lawrence, Great Lakes and Hudson knew of the strawberry's use as a medicinal plant. Others may have known this lore, too. The strawberry grows on both continents.

> From time immemorial, design, shape and colour have encoded stories. In Spirit Seeds, we are privileged to see the "Haienwahta' Belt of the Five Nations." It is the record of a revered treaty. In this display, it is accompanied by a text explaining its importance to the Haudenosanee peoples: the Mohawk, Oneida, Onondaga, Cayuga and Seneca. Treaties are records of agreement and obligation for all parties as Chief

Traditionally, beading and embroidery among the Woodlands peoples were the work of women. Today, both men and women do this work. A short film entitled *Going on Dreams* accompanies the exhibition and tells us a few of the stories of

this medium. We see several examples of contemporary work in the large, centred exhibition case.

Contemporary artist Samuel Thomas, for example, made the wood and leather travelling trunk to honour the memory of his mother. Its beaded panels of flowers and hummingbirds encase her writings within. Thomas also made the two white moccasins with trailing strings and crystal beads to "wash away the tears we shed." Graham Paradis worked long and hard to create an elegant ensemble of a man's vest, bandolier and satchel. Paradis' work displays his hard-won knowledge and respect for his heritage.


In Ottawa currently are two major exhibitions Women of the 19th century, both indigenous of contemporary indigenous art: Abadakone at the National Gallery of Canada, and Inaabiwin at the Ottawa Art Gallery. Now add Spirit Seeds at the Mississippi Valley Textile Museum in downtown Almonte. This important exhibition, curated by Naomi Smith, continues until December 14. Find
