





# Jen Drysdale — In The Moment

together to talk about pots. So I was excited to meet with Jen Drysdale at her home/studio in Carp. Both potters, we share a love of the most malleable of materials: clay. We love the forms, functions and glazes of ceramics. We love how something as subtle as a dimple in the side of a bowl can be so beautifully expressive of its maker's thoughtful intention.

A good potter understands clay and is able to let it "speak" in the studio. Jen Drysdale is one such potter. She has developed an innate sensitivity for clay through years of making pots and through watching masters at work. This foundation has helped her pottery to blossom with confidence.

You may recognize Jen from the Almonte Potters Guild (where she teaches evening classes), the Glebe Community Centre (where she's the Ceramics technician), 260 Fingers (an annual ceramic exhibition in Ottawa) or from seeing her work displayed at General Fine Craft in Almonte. She's one of those understated but essential members of our local craft community.

Jen's first exposure to clay was at her high school in Toronto, leading to a pottery course with Thorncliffe Park's Peta Hall. This was a time of discovery that solidified her love of making pots.

Over the ensuing years she was uprooted many times, but didn't seem to mind the frequent moves. She says, "I never saw moving as a negative thing... because friends can be made everywhere." Along the way she raised two children, became an accomplished scuba diver, and continued to learn about pottery by making and selling her work.

Importantly, she also attended a lot of work-

Maybe it's obvious, but potters love to get were Harlan House, Robert Tetu, Bruce Cochrane, Carol Anne Michaelson, Wayne Cardinelli and Cathi Jefferson. In 1992 she settled in the Ottawa area and studied with Carolynne Pynn-Trudeau and Chandler Swain. She joined the Ottawa Guild of Potters and started showing locally.

In her studio practice, Jen begins by throwing well-defined shapes on the potter's wheel. She may cut and alter, carve facets, squish the form from round to oval or create a pattern with tool marks. She may add spouts, handles or a long neck to give a specific function. Because she understands the strengths and limits of clay, she can sensitively manipulate it with a special combination of looseness and control; this is the great duality of pottery-making that takes years of trial and error to achieve.

Until 2013 Jen was producing oxidation-fired stoneware meant for everyday use. Beautifully sensitive forms, luscious handles and spouts, subtle glaze colours and textures were her signature. It was about this time that she became curious about the unique process of wood-firing. Revered in Japan, Korea and China for thousands of years, it incorporates the extreme heat of a specifically-designed kiln that is carefully stoked with wood over several days. It requires hard work and determination, so one has to be made of sturdy stuff to pursue it. The random effects of wood ash deposits and the path of flames throughout the kiln play a pivotal role in the look of

As it goes, happy accidents can sometimes lead to greater things. Jen signed up for a wood-fire workshop with the accomplished potters Tony Clennell and Bruce Dehnert. The workshop was to happen in Aylmer (Quebec, she assumed). Turns out it was actually at Tony's familial pottery Pinecroft Studios near Aylmer, Ontario... an eight-hour drive from shops by iconic Canadian potters. Among them Carp! Despite the distance, this was an opportunity

> she could not miss. At Pinecroft she worked with a small group of energized potters to load the outdoor kiln with prepared pots, brick it closed, and stoke it continuously in shifts over 36 hours. The hot fire and intense camaraderie was exhilarating. Jen was thrilled with the whole experience, particularly when the kiln's smoke stack spewed huge flames into the night sky. "Now, that was dramatic!" she recalls with a grin.

> It was such a success that she was selected for a year-long mentorship program with Clennell, sponsored by the Hamilton Potters Guild. The group met seven times to fire, allow the kiln to cool, unload and critique the result-





ing work. Unlike Jen, most of the participants were graduates of the Sheridan School of Craft ceramics program, known as one of the best of its kind in Canada. Despite feeling intimidated by the "artspeak" used during initial crits, Jen was able to find her own voice and her own wisdom. She feels that: "you are in your work, even if you are not always conscious of it."

The unpredictable nature of the wood-fire process suits her pots well; flames, ash and soda randomly highlight the textures and curves in beautiful ways. Most of the colour of her pots is a direct result of the wood-fire process. This gives them a scorched, melty and dramatic look that really can't be achieved by any other means.

Back at Jen's home, I'm unabashedly looking through her shelves of pottery — the collected work of dozens of potters. Jen cites a poignant quote from Tony Clennell: "Having only your own work around you is like talking to yourself all the time." This underscores how important it is as a potter to surround yourself with the work of others — that which inspires you. Every piece of pottery has its own character and feel in the hand; each appeals to the senses in a different way.

Jen is not one to sit still. She continues to evolve her techniques and glaze palette within the parameters of wood-firing, and wants to learn more. This spring she'll be travelling to Peter's Valley School of Craft in New Jersey to participate in a noborigama kiln workshop with potters Takuro and Hitomi Shibata. "Workshops are so energizing!" she says. "They make me realize this is why I'm here, in this moment."

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

# **Great Coffee & Art, No Pressure!**

A good coffee shop is so much more than merely a place to ingest caffeine. In the case of Carleton Place's **Under Pressure Coffee House**, it's a spot to connect with friends, partake in some delicious food (and of course the aforementioned caffeinated beverages), and a multi-disciplinary arts incubator to boot!


Owner Cara Lewis is relatively new to the Ottawa Valley, but not to the world of coffee and tea. For years she worked in sales and distribution of coffee and tea in England, where she eventually also opened a retail shop and a coffee shop. After a brief stop in Vermont, she decided that Canada was calling her, and — luckily for us — wound up hanging out her shingle in Carleton Place.

One of the first things you notice upon entering Under Pressure is, ironically, the laid-back atmosphere. Seating is casual and plentiful, and the walls are adorned with striking art — a combination of painting and photography by a variety of local artists. Towards the back of the shop you'll even find some three-dimensional art like knitting and ceramics, as well as books by local authors.

And if you patronize the establishment on a fairly regular basis (or just happen to be lucky), you may get to drink your latté while being serenaded by a very talented local musician! The last time I was in (enjoying a most delicious London Fog, I might add), I got to hear two sets by the young singer/songwriter and guitar-player extraordinaire Brad Scott. Brad's rich vocals and exceptional finger-style guitar playing were just perfect for the venue, and it was a terrific way to pass a Sunday afternoon. While I was there, I noticed that representatives from both Almonte's Folkus Concert Series and Perth's Stewart Park Festival popped in for a listen (probably not a coincidence!).

So why is a coffee shop working so hard to promote local artists? In Cara's own words: "the support I've had from local people has been amazing, so supporting local artists feels like a great way to pay it back." She is particularly passionate about helping younger artists get "a break", and encourages them to tell the story of their art so that people will connect with them on a more personal basis. So far she has found that her patrons seem to appreciate that approach, as she


## **Brad Scott's CD Release**





# Carving a Niche in the Cultural Landscape

Almonte's Sue Adams. Metaphor, a solo exhibition of her sculptures and drawings, is featured until April 16.

It is impossible to describe the emotive impact of Adams' work exhibited in Sanjeev Sivarulrasa's new gallery. The austere simplicity of the white and black interior is the perfect showcase for her profoundly thought-provoking depictions of the sacred and profane aspects of human nature. Ethereal yet earthly, mythical yet hyperrealistic, they elucidate the intrinsic struggles that threaten human existence. If you haven't seen it yet, go.

The Gallery describes her twenty drawings and sculptures thus: "Working primarily with the human form, Sue Adams' work explores themes

of passion, pain, frailty and grace. Her figures exhibit nomically. His impressive telescope is still on display, strength, vulnerability and primal energy, giving voice to humanity's inherent contradictions." Back in January of 2002, I quoted Adams as saying: "Sometimes I pray for fearlessness to go into the human psyche art dealer, museum curator, and and reach into the soul." She believes that art should offer something that is not visible to the human eye; it should cause an instinctive reaction. She succeeds. Her exploration of the condition of being human is His former career as a tax lawyer provocative, evocative and utterly compelling.

## A Sculptor's Dream






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# Lanark's Legacy **Cottage Program**



# The Joy of Singing

Singing is something that carries across all cultures and all time periods. Theories are starting to emerge that our ancestors were singing and vocalizing musical sounds before they were speaking. In other words, musical sounds played a direct role in the development of spoken language.

We can see this concept in action when we look at parents and their newborns. We sing to babies instinctively, and there is an incredible bond that is formed between parent and child through singing. Even though babies can't understand what is being sung to them, they are naturally drawn to the sound of a human voice making musical sounds.

pretty amazing things about singing. One of the most exciting new discoveries is that group singing results in the release of serotonin and oxytocin, which is a bonding hormone. They have even noticed that heart rates can become synchronized. This explains why we feel so exhilarated after communal singing activities. The speculation is that these feelings of happiness are an evolutionary tool that has helped people come together in community. This would also explain why hymns play such an important role in most religions. They are something that brings people together under a common set of beliefs and ideals.

Despite all of this research, our society continues to be one where people often feel uncomfortable singing in front of others. I was conducting a band rehearsal recently and asked my saxophone section to sing a

I think that we as a society have instinctively known all along what neuroscientists are now beginning to tell us about the value of singing, especially singing in groups. This ritual is everywhere. As I mentioned earlier, religions make extensive use of communal singing. Songs have become an important part of our sporting culture, especially in soccer. Premier League matches in England feature non-stop singing from beginning to end. These songs bring fans together and create a unique culture for every team.

Unlike being in a band or orchestra, you don't Neuroscientists have started discovering some need to read music to be able to sing in a choir. We are born with these unique instruments that are ready to make music with others. Incidences of "tone-deafness" are extremely rare, and just about anyone can make music by singing with others. People who are not strong individual singers are almost always able to learn to blend their voices within a larger group.

> The next time that you catch yourself singing or whistling a tune because you are in a good mood, know that this is part of your biological makeup. We are hardwired to sing. In the words of Sesame Street composer Joe Raposo, "don't worry if it's not good enough for anyone else to hear. Sing, sing a song!"

It has been argued that without beer there is no possibility of civilization. Weetabix has heard such arguments and therefore does not write about beer.



On the other hand, upon visiting the Cheshire Cat, it is striking how much depth and variety exists in local breweries. Over 24 taps and two casks are on offer and driven by consumer apps which identify local availability of various brews. People come here for the "beer scene". Owner-proprietor Dustin Therien is not only enthusiastically knowledgeable about beer; he has made a substantial investment in sophisticated technologies which ensure that each beer he serves is proffered under optimum conditions. What you get is "as intended" by the brewmasters. Enough about this particular aspect, as Weetabix is both out of his comfort zone and off topic; if you are a beer fancier, just go and enjoy — but not all varieties at one session.

So, dear reader, given that lead-in, why am I writing up the Cheshire Cat Pub? Because, in addition to being a keystone element to the ferment taking place within the beer community, Dustin Therien runs an excellent restaurant and pub. The man is a creative dynamo and an inspiring leader who is a major mover in the developing local food scene. An extensive network of suppliers includes producers and wholesalers who interact to support a food ecosystem. Dustin is a major and influential participant in this ecosystem; not only as a purchaser but as a supplier and as an active promoter of the people and ideas who are its




notices a bar with an impressive (over 200!) collection of whiskeys, as well as the aforementioned 24 taps and two kegs. For some, this may be where the trip stops. For others, there is a small cozy space with a number of tables and a wood stove that gives an erroneous impression of a small dining area. There is more space upstairs and on the (seasonal) patio. Even so, the parking lot appears large for the number of seats, and leads Weetabix to ask about staffing and traffic; interesting to find out that there are 55 people employed in food preparation and serving. Clearly not all the food made at the Cheshire Cat is consumed on the premises!

Dustin informs us that he has a growing lunch trade in the business park — much of it for group lunches and on delivery. Our conversation zigzags over operational issues and swings from the development of his local supply chain through his new extension, the Carp Custom Creamery. Keeping up with him is as challenging in conversation as it would be physically, and his operating motto is "get better at everything you do every day". The evidence is that he walks the walk. From buying out the previous owner in 2005 through rebuilding after a fire in 2014, Dustin has taken challenges and opportunities in rapid stride.

Crystal Therien, an accountant, is a co-owner and an integral part of the operations. Dustin credits her as having "the less glamorous roll of organizing and managing the tornado that is me and all the chaos that I bring, as well as doing all the grown-up things within our pub that my adolescent brain doesn't have the capacity or will to do". Several years ago the husband and wife team had the good judgment to re-assess their operations; they decided to limit and refocus the scope of their growing empire in light of their lifestyle aspirations, which included staying on a first-name basis with their kids. They sold Alice's Village Café to Todd and Melanie as a result (see the brought us back to check additional items on the January issue of the Humm for details).

Their new initiative, the Carp Custom Creamery, ties to the pub in several interesting ways and is developing along a business path that takes advantage of Dustin's strong and growing relationships with his suppliers and colleagues in the hospitality trade. Not only do they make several killer flavours of premium ice cream; they are set up to make custom small lunch at the Cheshire Cat.

batches of "bespoke" ice cream for other restaurants and pubs. Making ice cream is not a casual undertaking; Dustin personally learned the craft from Douglas Goff at Guelph University's hands-on Ice Cream Technology Course. There is a freezer at the Cheshire Cat where you can pick up a litre or more — as well as some other prepared foods to go, so here is an important hint about visiting the Cheshire Cat: bring an insulated container and stock up. Truly food you can enjoy the next day too!

Multiple visits were made to the Cheshire Cat in preparation for this article — food and ambience menu. Pub food is not light eating but it is very satisfying, and the skills of the kitchen brigade are evident in everything we sampled, including frozen take-out items. Menu descriptions are accurate and service is very competent and generally prompt. This is a busy pub and reservations are recommended; Weetabix has none about recommending dinner or



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



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# **Get Gardening...**

The production and consumption of food plays a huge role in our society. Obviously we require food for our basic sustenance, but the role of food in our society is incredibly more complex than that. It forms the basis for celebration and for community and relationship events. Many of our annual celebrations are based on pagan celebrations that were very much structured around the annual cycles of life on our planet as they affect our production of food.

In our local community, there were line-ups on a Sunday morning in March as dozens waited patiently for pancakes and sausages at the Union Hall. How many of us highlight church suppers on our calendars?

Local food production is very much on the minds of local gardeners as this endless winter makes a last stand.

Many gardeners in Carleton Place and area were delighted to learn that they have been awarded a \$4,700 grant to rejuvenate the garden next to St. Gregory School on Townline Road. The Community Gardeners formed a partnership with the Lanark County Food Bank (aka the Hunger Stop) to apply for a grant from a program administered by the Ontario Association of Food Banks with funding coming from Sysco, a large food wholesaling and distribution company

tools; watering depends on the availability of rain barrels, many of which are cracked and leaking; and the clay soil is no longer friable. Many gardeners have left the program due to the difficult growing conditions; others for whom the garden is critical to their dietary requirements have persevered. The Community Garden Rejuvenation will be led by the Lanark County Food Bank in collaboration with existing gardeners at the site, and in consultation with local Master Gardeners. A new Carleton Place men's group, the Hackberry Men's Shed, has agreed to design and build the shed and other structures that are part of the plan. Circle the dates April 29 and





# Mudds Set Sail on the H.M.S. Pinafore

It's time to polish up the handle on the big front door, head out and sail the ocean blue!

The **Mississippi Mudds**, Carleton Place's well-loved community theatre, will be presenting a classic this spring: Gilbert and Sullivan's perennial favourite, H.M.S. Pinafore, the story of the lass that loved a sailor.

First performed in London in 1878, it is quite simply the most popular show in the history of musical theatre. Gilbert's witty dialogue and lyrics, and Sullivan's beautiful vocal harmonies, have packed houses ever since then — it's estimated that every day, somewhere in the world, someone is performing *H.M.S Pinafore*.

The current Mudds production acknowledges the place that this musical has in English theatre, and adheres very closely to the storied history of this time-honoured institution. "We're doing a very traditional production — using Gilbert's text, Sullivan's

music, with staging that follows the form of the first production, and costumes based as closely upon the originals as possible," says director Mark Piper. "The whole production has been created as an homage to Gilbert and Sullivan's original — there are a couple of tiny bits that introduce some current laughs, of which Gilbert would, I think, have approved — but all in all, this show has the look and feel of that first production back in 1878."

The story is well known: Captain Corco- way into the culture ran's beautiful daughter Josephine is sought in of English musical marriage by the First Lord of the Admiralty, Sir Joseph Porter, KCB, but is secretly in love with a humble sailor, Ralph Rackstraw. Unbeknownst to her, Ralph loves her as well, but she is high above his station in life, and to him and his shipmates (the crew of the H.M.S. Pinafore) the barriers between them seem insurmountable. During Sir Joseph's visit to the Pinafore — accompanied, as always by his cousin Hebe and the admiring crowd of sisters, cousins, and aunts that follow him everywhere he goes — the evil sailor Dick Deadeye exposes the romance, and brave and noble Ralph is sent in chains to the dungeon for his unwarranted presumption. But through the intervention of the mysterious gypsy woman Little Buttercup, evil Dick Deadeye's plans are foiled, and the lovers reunited, and happiness reigns supreme as the final curtain closes.

> The musical score is choca-bloc with well-known favourites that will have every person in the audience (along with their sisters, and their cousins, and their aunts) leaving the theatre humming a favourite ditty. From *He is an Englishman* to I'm Called Little Buttercup, What Never? Well, Hardly Ever!, We Sail the Ocean Blue, and Now I am the Ruler of the Queen's Navee, these delightful comic opera pieces have inextricably woven their

theatre since that very first opening night.

This season's cast is made up of an exciting new group of Mudds performers. Mike McCormick (of Kingston supergroup The Arrogant Worms fame) is taking the main comedic lead of Sir Joseph Porter, navigating all the patter songs with panache and aplomb (actually, those are the names of his two Dachshunds — okay, we stole his joke).



some are new to us, so I was excited to learn more about them and their plans for the future. Pat Purdy (profiled in our April 2016 issue) was kind enough to answer my questions.

#### theHumm: What was the impetus behind the formation of this group?

Pat Purdy: Our group evolved from a chance meeting of like-minded artists who decided it would be creative, fun, and social to get together and paint. We initially started meeting in my studio, but as lunch was often involved we eventually found a local venue near our favourite restaurant for weekly gatherings. We are a mentoring, creative and social group. Our goals include furthering our personal artistic development and skills, networking, and increasing our artistic expertise.

#### For artists who often work alone, what are some of the benefits of regularly coming together as a group of this size?

The group consists of a variety of members who mainly painted alone but,



# A Folkus Season Finale with Merritt!

"...it's always a treat when Scott Merritt emerges from his self-imposed performing exile... remarkable, inspirational songs." — Echo Magazine

While often critically cited as one of the great, unsung singer-songwriters of Canada, Scott Merritt has released only six albums since beginning his career in the late '70s back in his hometown of Brantford, Ontario. He is perhaps better known these days as a producer and engineer. He actually produced a number of albums by this year's Folkus season opener, Garnet Rogers, including Rogers' most recent. Indeed, Merritt has produced many beloved albums over the years, having worked with Fearing and White, Fred Eaglesmith, Kevin Breit, Tannis Slimmon, Matt Anderson, Mike Stevens, and Ian Tamblyn. He has recently started touring with his own material again, and Folkus is thrilled that he will be playing the Old Almonte Town Hall stage.

Merritt's compositions are thoughtful and delicate. His guitar work is nimble without being egotistical, and his lyrics are well served by his slightly husky voice. His latest album release, Of, has been described as a "gloriously stripped down musically elegant acoustic collection of eight songs melded with Merritt's poetic perspective

on life out of focus. *Of* is sublime because of what is not there."





# **Getting a Move On**

When we look at historical data from spring migration, we are able to see change over time — "the runway effect", I call it. Gradually changing, picking up speed and then bang! lift-off, or dramatic change. I feel we saw liftoff and dramatic change all winter this year. Lots of birds that historically are not here in the winter were here in large numbers: robins, red-winged blackbirds, northern flickers and so on. We also have had many reports of (as well as our own sightings of) red-bellied woodpeckers, tufted titmouses, eastern bluebirds, American kestrels, hermit thrushes and more.

Then the great grey owl eruption happened late in the winter this year. It seemed like suddenly sightings started to pour in from all over the area, but as quickly as they were here, they were gone.

Backyard birding is one of the best hobbies, because every day can be different, as can every migration year. Keep your feeders full and your senses on alert — this is a fun time of year. Here are a few points to ponder regarding spring and fall migration.

Spring migration is a favourite of many birders, particularly those in northern climates, as it signals the changing of the seasons and the influx of warmer weather, green grass and new visitors to our backyard

Fall migration on the other hand can be a more bittersweet period for us bird lovers, as we do our utmost to provide our backyard visitors with the very best in feed and seed, helping them on their long migration journeys to their winter homes.





Spring migration is one of the most exciting times for birders — and for birds!

These seasons, however, differ in a few key ways. Other than the obvious points of travelling in opposite directions and seasonal timing, there are a few considerations birds make in the spring migration that differ greatly from their motivations of the fall migration. Urgency is a big motivational factor for birds during the spring. They are anxiously and sometimes aggressively racing, so to speak, to reach their breeding grounds, claim their stake and attract a mate to later raise their young. Competition plays a huge role in spring migration; as the saying goes, the early bird gets the worm.

Individual migrants are more often sighted during the spring migration as well, rather than the large flocks we are used to seeing in the late fall months. While some species will always stick together, there are a number of migrants who will take their own path, often believed to be caused by the competitive nature and urgency mentioned above that comes with the spring season.

Perhaps one of my favourite differences between the two seasons is the plumage, as spring brings out the very vibrant colouring across all species of birds. Males are always donning their very best colours in the spring in hopes of attracting a mate, while in the fall most plumage takes on a more dull, worn look.

No matter what the season, there is always a lot to see and do out in the field. As more of our summer visitors begin to show up at our backyard feeders, we invite you to contact us on Facebook or stop by the store and let us know what you have been seeing so far this spring. Happy spring watching!

# When the Chips Were Down, **Did the Deer Rise?**

Ads luring us to discover our ancestry are "the thing" these days. The usual pay-off? One-dimensional printouts without any real sense of life and place.

How much more satisfying to go back generations in your own Ottawa Valley backyard with two great storytellers — Rory MacKay and Michael Runtz — connecting the dots to the land and the wildlife

You'll have that opportunity on April 28 at Arn-Macnamara Field Naturalists' Club (MFNC) hosts "Axes to Ashes, Singing Saws to Howling Wolves: How Lumbering Changed the Nature of the Ottawa Valley".

Rory MacKay, author and long-time "student" of logging history, will transport us back 200 years to the rich forests of historic logging days, while Carleton University teacher and naturalist Michael Runtz will interpret how the events and practices of those years brought about today's array of plants and animals.

Both speakers are known for their wicked sense of humour. Combined, the duo make for a dynamic

and informative evening on the human and natural history of our area.

The presentations, which begin at 7PM, will raise funds to extend Arnprior's Macnamara Nature Trail, an interpretive trail operated by the MFNC. Doors open at 6PM so come early to check out the displays from local organizations.

Tickets are \$15 in advance, \$10 for ages 18 and under, and \$20 at the door. They are available locally prior's St. John Chrysostom Parish Hall, when the at the Arnprior Library, Gilligallou Bird (in Almonte and Ottawa) and online at <mfnc.ca>.

## What About the Deer?

First, let's situate ourselves with an overview. MacKay notes: "The logging industry in the Ottawa Valley began in 1806. Over the next century, white pine and red pine were cut and squared in the forest, then driven down the Ottawa River to Quebec City, there to be loaded into ships destined for Britain. By the 1860s, smaller pine began to be cut into logs and driven by river to be sawn into lumber at sawmills at Arnprior and Ottawa. Lumbering techniques changed over time. Lumberman J. R. Booth built railways to make it possible to keep logs moving to his mills and sawn lumber getting to market the

First clue: All the felling and squaring of pine left chips in the forest that led to fires. Together axes and ashes brought change to the Ottawa Valley. So: when the chips were down, did the deer rise? Did the change to the forest (via the wood chips and fires/ ashes from logging) cause a local rise in the deer population? Find out at the event! And yes, that play on words is a Michael Runtz original!

#### Life and Work in the Woods

"Over the past 200 years, there have been dramatic changes in the animal life of the Ottawa Valley," notes Runtz. "Beavers, once so rare they were seldom seen, are now common. The type of wolves found around here changed not once but thrice. Moose were replaced by white-tailed deer, and bald eagles, which became endangered, are now common sights."

You can expect great visuals as Runtz and MacKay paint a picture for us of the striking changes that have taken place, and they'll give insight into others

Some have a special connection to Charles Macnamara, the local naturalist and amateur scientist extraordinaire in whose honour the Macnamara Nature Trail is named. Starting as an accountant in 1855 and eventually becoming secretary-treasurer, Macnamara worked at the Mclachlin Bros. lumber firm until its closure in 1936. Best known as a talented amateur naturalist and photographer who extensively documented the animals and plants of the Arnprior area, Macnamara was also a recognized historian of the Ottawa River. He made frequent journeys to the shanties and had a host of friends who spent their winters in the camps.

Fittingly, this fundraiser to extend the Macnamara Nature Trail is one of Arnprior's 150 events marking Canada's 150th. Bring your passport to get it stamped!
