





# Where to Eat in...?

As sometime driver and sherpa for the Humm's roving arts reporter (the incomparable Ms. Hansen), I find myself at the mercy of chance encounters with the region's eateries — sometimes regrettably so, but on occasion pleasurably. As illustrated by the following anecdote, a guide for non-natives could be provided as a service to the readers of your fine publication.

Thursday, November 5, 2015: on assignment, our destination somewhere miles from any village or town likely to host even a sandwich shop. Much driving is required, and your arts reporter has scheduled her interview for early afternoon.

Feeding is required and our vehicle lacks provisions. Route is via Smiths Falls, and there will be multiple opportunities to insult our gastrointestinal systems, but is there any other choice? Trip Advisor advises there are 54 restaurants in Smiths Falls — yikes! Some reading ensues and it appears there are multiple options that offer more promise that Tim's or Micky D's, but how to choose?

A brilliant thought occurs and we consult our list of the Humm's distribution points. Success! Just a small jog from our planned route and we are at **Main Street Bistro** (formerly the Good Life Bistro & Bakery, now located at 5 Main St. West, Smiths Falls), where we are greeted and seated by a very cheerful person who advises us that everything is made from scratch. Hungrily I inquire as to the supply of scratch, and am reassured.

We order and are promptly served an excellent vegetable soup, a falafel wrap(!) and quesadilla (all excellent and ample as to portions). The bakery case offers many temptations but restraint prevails, and I am still able to get behind the steering wheel. Prices very reasonable and ambience pleasant — altogether felt like it was a good choice and, should our travels bring us to Smiths Falls again, one which we will repeat. Certainly one to recommend — which brings me to the main point here; could there be a correlation between Humm distribution points and gastronomic quality? AND should this point be researched and documented? Some random evidence supports the thesis at least as far as where to eat in Almonte and Carleton Place, but clearly more work is needed.

# Syrian Refugee Help

Since late summer, as the daily news brought more details of the terrible situation relentlessly unfolding, a number of groups in the community of Mississippi Mills have been forming to help the huge number of Syrian refugees fleeing war in their country.

Neighbours were talking to neighbours, church congregations were working with their ongoing refugee support programs, and individuals were looking to help if they could. Communities across Canada were swinging into action.

In order for our community to work more effectively, an umbrella group was formed with the help of Arnie Francis and Ingrid Kadoke: the Syrian Refugee Committee of Mississippi Mills (SRCMM). The committee was created to keep everyone in the loop and help streamline the process, complete with a Facebook Group to organize the flow of information coming our way. It was agreed that up to five refugee families could be sponsored in Mississippi Mills.





# John Shea — **Landscapes Illustrate** that Less Can Be More

Shea's original perspective on winter landscapes that feature local heritage buildings has just earned him an impressive honour. His works placed him among the top five sellers during the 25th annual Autumn Art Sale at the McMichael Canadian Art Collection in Kleinburg a few weeks ago. In addition to his framed ribbon, his success guarantees him a prime spot at next year's prestigious event.

Painting with watercolours on paper, Shea renders striking architectural portraits of 19th century Eastern Ontario stone buildings. His gift for subtraction is the signature feature of his work that first-time viewers invariably note. The absence of distraction highlights the sculpture of the structures and adds to the serenity, and occasionally the drama, of the scene. On his website <john-shea.artistwebsites.com>, Shea quotes renowned 20th century artist Andrew Wyeth as saying, "What is important in a painting is what is not there."

Another Wyeth quote explains the sense of mystery that Shea's portraits often evoke: "I prefer winter and fall, when you feel the bone structure of the landscape. Something waits beneath it; the whole story doesn't show." In a very real way, Shea's paintings speak to the Canadian experience of winter. The "bone structure" of heritage buildings isolated in rolling expanses of white snowdrifts suggests both the serenity and the underlying menace that Arctic temperatures and unpredictable weather pose. It seems fitting that his works are popular at the McMichael, where viewers come to celebrate the quintessentially Canadian landscapes of the Group of Seven.

#### **Learning to Subtract**

When Shea was a kid growing up in Montreal, his high school math teacher told him, "Shea, you're never going to amount to anything if you keep skipping math class." Undaunted, Shea continued to spend all available time in the art room. After graduation he attended the School of Art and Design at the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts and won


As a result of the 1970 FLQ October Crisis, Shea's parents moved to Perth, and John started utes to his recognition throughout Ontario making regular weekend visits. He bought an old, one-room schoolhouse in Bolingbroke (south of Maberly), and spent the next twelve years living in a constant state of renovation. Later he lived in a house on Farren Lake. After earning a diploma in interior design at Algonquin College, he joined the Ottawa firm of Saunders and MacFarlane, where he produced architectural renderings and presentation drawings for four years.

> Despite (or maybe because of) the dire predictions of his math teacher, John had always wanted



to teach. He applied to Syracuse University and was accepted as a third-year student to acquire the prerequisite BFA degree, after which he earned his B.Ed. at Queen's University. He looks back with pleasure at his 25 years of teaching art at St. John Catholic High School in Perth. "I loved empowering them with the basic tools of art, especially perspective." He brought his guitar and banjo into his grade eleven interior design class, and serenaded students as they worked on models of significant projects such as condos and commercial structures.

In 1998, Shea moved to his present location at Rosal Bay on Newboro Lake. It is a stunning location and an amazing house. With his wife Karen and daughter Molly, they have created an oasis of beauty for all seasons. Karen is an accomplished gardener, and even in October the evidence of her



expertise and hard work is apparent. John creates his unique watercolour compositions at their dining room table overlooking a scene of breathtaking natural beauty. Gazing out at the magnificent view he enjoys, I sense the influence it exerts on his exceptional art.

Shea tells me that a major component of his work is his love for the integrity of the stone that he depicts. "Whether it's a simple wall, a bridge or an elaborate building, it's the permanence of the stone that makes my subjects timeless." He values composition, line and balance over colour and texture, presenting a traditional subject in a modern and highly original way.

Many people are surprised to learn that he paints with watercolours on paper that he wets, stretches on board and frames himself. He loves the spontaneity and the challenges his choice of medium provides: "With watercolour you can't go back, you can't cover mistakes, it's in the moment."

#### **Less Is More**

In 1947, architect Mies van der Rohe appropriated the phrase "less is more" as a fundamental precept for Minimalist design and architecture. Minimalism in visual art emerged in New York in the early 1960s, and the use of negative space became a key component. In design, negative space is the breathing room around the subject that draws your eye to it, and determines how appealing it looks. In John's paintings, composition is paramount, and he is a master of subtraction. With his selective use of emptiness he accomplishes two things. He invites us to examine his masterful capture of architectural subjects, and he creates a sense of mystery. We are intrigued by what is not there; we are seduced into providing our own interpretation of the blank spaces. As John puts it, "Where there is nothing, there is

He began showing his works at art festivals in 2009, and discovered how much he enjoyed the camaraderie of fellow artists. He especially values the feedback he gets from the people who stop to look at and enquire about his paintings. He recalls a conversation one afternoon with a widow who was struggling to convert her husband's favourite room into a meditative space for herself. She showed up at 10:00 the next morning with tears in her eyes to tell him that she had had a dream about the painting she had been considering, and she




# The Gift of a **Good (Local) Read**

# Barns: A Reflection of Changing Times


Smith's heart since she was a young girl.

"Old barns have spoken to me since I was a child," says the popular local author and historian. "I remember going to the family cottage near Killaloe in Renfrew County and several times a week we would go to a farm to get our mail and eggs. While my grandparents passed the time of day with the postmistress, I ran to the line of old log barns and drank in the beauty of the logs and the golden colour of the pine sheathing

boards. The times when the heavy horses were in their stalls added to my delight. I remember those days because I always felt transported — like I had walked in another time."

Smith has captured many of those memories in her latest book Barns: A Reflection of Changing Times. Not only does the book capture those memories, and often enchantingly so, it comprehensively outlines how barns in Lanark County have evolved — "from the first log shanty barns of settlement, to the threshing barns of a grain economy, to the big timber-frame structures of the dairy



economy." Through photographs, family stories, farm histories and a wealth of researched material, Smith paints a colourful and often charming portrait of these key structures.

She refers to barns as "the heart of the farm" and "the backbone of agricultural communities." Smith feels a magical — almost spiritual — connection with heritage barns and their unique and fascinating histories.

"Since moving to Lanark County thirty-five years ago," she says, "that almost psychic sensitivity to rural history has led me to collecting oral histo-

Barns have held a special place in Claudia ry. Over the years I have met many wonderful people, and sharing the gathered history is my passion."

From that passion came Claudia's latest book, which reflects the changes in farming in Lanark County over the years by examining the wealth of local barn histories. Smith skillfully examines the history of these heritage barns with a kind, keen eye, conveying the flavour of local customs and ways of life. By highlighting how Lanark County's barns were built and by whom, she records, for generations to come, the names of skilled professionals whose work and legacies might have otherwise been lost in the mists of time; and how the craft of building these barns — "which dominated landscapes, sheltered livestock, protected harvests, and gave families a sense of security" — has evolved over the years.

Right down to the tiniest detail, Smith is charmed by almost every aspect of these indispensable structures. "Every barn has a different atmosphere to it," she says, "whether from its design, the workmanship displayed in the doors, pens and latches, or the evidence of good planning for efficiency in the daily round of chores. I love to see what is hanging on hooks or put on windowsills to be saved for use on another day."

In Barns: A Reflection of Changing Times, Smith writes about windowless "low-down log barns," built in the 1860s by early settlers using round pine logs, their roofs made with bark slabs. "The settlers were glad of any advice they could get," she writes, "and helped each other get settled on their farms."

She offers these fascinating snippets from a carpenter's diary, from 1845, giving readers a glimpse into early barn history: "Boarding the sides of the threshing floor... Raising a stable for Widow Gorse... Hewing out lintels for doors and windows... It was last night that Samuel Todd's barn was burned."

Smith admittedly has a soft spot for these earliest barns, skillfully built by folks who were basically just getting the hang of it.

"The old log barns transport me to homesteading days," she says, "but I love the solidity of the timber frame barns where the magnificent skill of the timber framers is on display in the hay lofts. The modern hay barns that are often plastic-covered shells do not ignite my imagination like the older ones, but farming has changed and barn building has had to change as well. Thus the title of my book Barns: A Reflection of Changing Times."

Times changed, indeed. By the mid-1800s, more and more farmers were increasing grain production and a new style of barn was needed to store the harvests, thus: "English barns designed for sheaf and hay storage became common." In the book there are many photos of English barns, with their timber frames, double wagon doors, haylofts, and

Barns had to change continuously, of course, as agriculture did. Dairy farming necessitated a "step

up" for cows — log stables and cow byres were added to give cattle more protection during the harsh winters. Not long after, around the early 1900s, more cattle-friendly "Pennsylvania" bank barns were built. Expert barn builders, such as the McGill Brothers from Blakeney, held positions of high esteem in the community. For good reason, their craftsmanship was publicly praised.

Smith also writes about barn raisings, and you can all but see and hear and smell the scene: the women serving large, hearty meals while the hard-working men work almost ceaselessly, eating in relays — typically followed at nightfall by a dance with fiddles and whisky, "whirling bodies and flying feet."

The detail in this book is astounding; the anecdotes charming, telling, and historically important; and the photographs detailing the unique nature of every barn, including barn art and distinctive door hasps and weather vanes, absolutely compelling. You don't need to be a farmer to fall in love with this book. You just have to be curious about the heritage barns you still sometimes see along concession lines and the highways and roads of Lanark County. Thankfully Claudia Smith has preserved many of their histories for generations to come.

"This year," says Peter Woodwark, Director of Music at St. James, "we celebrate the life and music of Sir David Willcocks, organist, choirmaster and composer who conducted the Cambridge Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols for seventeen years." For many people, this service is the sound of Christmas, and it was David Willcocks who turned a Victorian invention into a landmark in the musical year, both in Cambridge and here in Perth.

On Sunday, December 20 at 7:30рм, this historic place of worship will resonate with joyful sound as St. James' Junior and Senior Choirs, St. Paul's United Church Choir, clergy and congregation once again join together in celebration and praise for the birth of Jesus Christ. The music will be directed by Peter Woodwark, Brad Mills (Musical Director at St. Paul's), and Val Leavitt (St James' Junior Choir Director).

The service follows a standard format, starting with the pure and beautiful sound of a soloist singing "Once in Royal David's City stood a lowly cattle shed", with the choir joining in the second verse as they process down the church to the chancel at the front.

In the words of the Bidding Prayer, the Reverend Kenneth Davis invites us "to hear again the message of the angels and, in heart and mind to go even unto Bethlehem and... see the Babe lying in a manger." The Nine Lessons from the Bible follow, interspersed with both familiar and new Christmas hymns and carols. These include Birthday Carol, written and composed by David Willcocks, his arrangements of three traditional carols — The Sussex Carol, Tomorrow Shall be my Dancing Day, and a Basque Noel entitled The Infant King.





# A Troubadour Comes Callin'

A true Canadian troubadour is coming to the area on Saturday, December 5!

Travelling minstrels have been around since the Middle Ages, travelling from town to town, reciting poetry or singing songs they'd written or heard elsewhere, often about happenings in surrounding areas they had travelled through. It's how people got their news and were entertained.

These days there are only a few of them left, and Jay Aymar has certainly earned the "Troubadour" moniker. Over the past twenty years he's been touring back and forth to cities, towns, hamlets and camp-

fires, doing what he does best: singing his selfpenned songs, telling captivating, often hilarious stories, and taking the time to sit down and chat with everyone he meets. These conversations often become fodder for new tunes. When you're on the road as often Jay is — a minimum of 250 to 300 days a year — it's the waitresses, bartenders, mechanics, hitchhikers and fellow road wanderers with whom you most often strike up conversations. It's a different life than most of us have experienced, and Jay has made the best of it, lonely as it can be. From playing cover tunes in rowdy bars, he's progressed to performing his own material in listening rooms, building a fan base across our fair land and gaining recognition from some of our best. When Canadian songwriting legend Ian Tyson heard the tune Jay wrote about Don Cherry having lost his wife Rose (My Cherry-Coloured Rose), Tyson arranged to record it on his own album. That says a lot to me about the quality of Jay's work.

Jay has a real narrative singing style. His stories catch your interest and keep it, leaving you looking for more. He's jovial, positive and insightful — one of those guys you meet once and feel you have as a lifelong friend. No ego; he's gentle and a great listener as well. We've spent many an enjoyable hour when he's crashed at our home after local shows solving all the world's problems, comparing notes on the state of the music industry these days — deep into the wee hours, joyfully. I've grown to look forward to those times.

After six albums, a lifetime of playing in those outback regions most just fly over, Jay's ever increasing fan base suggested that he write blogs, so he did. Realizing the interest they generated, he's put them together into a book called *The Chicken Came* First, subtitled and other half-truths from my life as a touring songwriter. I really enjoyed reading the book as it gives such interesting perspectives from the eyes and pen of a travelling musician. Imagine playing on the tenth deck of a cruise ship on the Mediterranean — for a six-month contract — seven evenings a week. It's worth the cost of the book just to read about that. Also included is a CD that beautifully captured his recent live concert at Trinity Church in Scarborough, ON, backed by a full band.

Last week I had the opportunity to attend a small media event about a new book coming out soon called The Beatles in Canada - the Origins of Bea*tlemania*, by Piers Hemmingsen. The book is a very detailed outline of how the Beatles' first album was pressed in Canada at the RCA plant in Smiths Falls in February of 1963. Capitol Records sub-contracted out to RCA to use their Smiths Falls pressing plant (where Cornelia Court is now, across from Garden Market). Many of the original staff at RCA were interviewed for the book, including Dennis Staples and Charlie Dalton, to name a few. The author calls Smiths Falls "the birthplace of The Beatles in North America". It was stated that the London mop-tops became stars in Canada about a year before they appeared on the Ed Sullivan Show in February 1964, which kick-started their appeal in the US.

Also in attendance at that event was Trudy Medcalf, who, at 14 years of age in 1963, saw the Beatles while in England at a seaside resort and, upon returning to her home in Toronto, wrote and gained permission to start the first Beatles Fan Club in Canada and in fact North America. The club's membership rose to over 100,000 fans. As a result, CHUM radio gave her a daily 15-minute radio show, and she met the Fab Four in both Toronto and New York. If you go to <thebeatlesincanada.com>, you can order this unique book. Dennis Staples said a more official kick-off to the book will happen in the new year in Smiths Falls, and there are plans underway to create a historic site for the RCA plant that at one time employed over 300 employees. Quite a story.

The Christmas season is almost upon us, so don't forget, when buying gifts, to support our local artists. I'm looking forward to kickin' back with my family, enjoying some tunes. From my family to you and yours, enjoy a safe and joyous holiday!

Girl, Oliver Stone's Snowden, Charlie Kaufman's Anomalisa, Stephen Fears' Lance Armstrong biopic The Program and, obviously, the latest Star Wars installment, which has already broken presale ticket records. The one I'm counting on most is Alejandro G. Iñárritu's The Revenant. If it's anything like its trailer, Iñárritu could expect another Oscar sweep like he did last February with Birdman. November brought some interesting films too, with a real mix of the good, the bad, and the

Baltasar Kormáku's *Everest* failed to live up to expectations, mainly due to the misuse of a stellar cast; Ant-Man was finally released on DVD and it was a hell of a lot of fun. Who knew Paul Rudd (much like Colin Firth earlier this year with *Kingsmen*) could be such a capable super hero? *The* Man from U.N.C.L.E was a fun albeit unremarkable excursion, and Eli Roth's double whammy - the cannibal flick The Green Inferno and the three-way-gone-bad Knock Knock —were utterly worthless and promptly disappeared from theatres. Spielberg's *Bridge of Spies* was a particularly unfortunate disappointment. The film is masterfully executed, showcasing Spielberg's typically bold lighting, lacquered veneer and deep cinematic craftsmanship. Yet, as with his last few films (Lincoln, War Horse, Indiana Jones and the Kingdom of the Crystal Skull), they seem obdurate and vacuous. Impeccably made, yet lacking whatever the "soul" of the movie is. It's as if Spielberg's become a director-for-hire instead of the brilliant, genre-

*Gay?*). But it's the profoundly heartbreaking documentary *Amy* that remains the best of the bunch. Amy is a superb, disarming film about the tumultuous personal and professional life of Amy Winehouse. In a year filled with films about tortured musicians — Montage of Heck (Kurt Cobain), Love & Mercy (Brian Wilson), What Happened, Miss Simone? (Nina Simone) — Asif Kapadia's Amy is by far the best. A Best Documentary nomination, if not win, should be a lock.

Surprisingly enough, one of the finest films of redefining practitioner he used to be. Bridge of the year comes to us from an online on-demand Spies is dense and uninteresting, despite some solid media provider. Netflix has been known for creat-

ing some truly amazing and original programming, such as Bloodline, House of Cards and Lilyhammer. Last month, they released their first ever feature film, Beasts of No Nation, written and directed by Cary Joji Fukunaga, and it is outstanding. You may know Fukunaga as the director of the brilliant first season of *True Detective*. His talent seems to escalate with each project he undertakes. His fluid, hazy lens and his predilection for intricate camera choreography really shine in *Beasts of No Nation*.

*Beasts* tells the tale of a young boy in an unnamed African country who falls into the hands of the domineering Commandant (Idris Elba from *Thor* and *The Wire*), the leader of a battalion of child soldiers. The young boy, Agu (a mesmerizing Abraham Attah in his acting début), deals with his position as diligently as possible, despite his anger and confusion, the Commandant's constant interference, and the fact that all this is really out of his control.

Idris Elba more than deserves a Supporting Actor nomination for his work here as the sociopathic Commandant with abnormal needs

and desires. Some obvious similarities to John Huston's The Man Who Would Be King (1975) will be made. Although vastly different films, both are thick with moral ambiguity and are unflinching in their depiction of disconcerting events. Beasts of No Nation is a brutal, passionate film and yes, you can get it on Netflix.

Italian filmmaker Paolo Sorrentino's second English-language film Youth, starring Michael Caine and Harvey Keitel, already premiered at Cannes in May but has been under the radar since. It's getting a proper release stateside this month and is well worth seeking out. Youth is filled with delightful images, sharp cynicism and nostalgia, a real sense of cinema, and more than one nod to Fellini. Caine (as a famous composer, now retired) and Keitel (as a famous filmmaker trying to complete his magnum opus) both give great performances

here as old friends vacationing in the Swiss Alps. Rachel Weisz and Paul Dano impress as well in their supporting roles, but it's Jane Fonda, who shows up for what could count as no more than a cameo (probably closer to ten minutes) as Keitel's leading lady and bearer of bad news, who absolutely steals the show. It's been a long time since Fonda has shown such power and faculty. And in such a small amount of time! A Supporting Actress nomination had better come her way. It would be her eighth nomination (she's already won twice), and her first in 29 years. If Anthony Hopkins can win an Oscar for sixteen minutes of screen time, Fonda can for ten.

Now it's onto December, when the big guns come out. Time to get prepared...



# Portmanteau...

# A Fantabulous Idea (You Might Consider)

out there?

Chances are, when you think of adver-

You like the ad. You remember it. But why exactly is it working for you — and working on you?

Insight sparks recognition. Much of the most memorable and effective advertising conveys insight. Insight into human nature... linked tightly to a brand. Insight reflecting universal truths. "It's funny because it's true." That kind of thing.

So what does this have to do with the portmanteau? And what is a portmanteau?

Here's an example, from a current McDonald's campaign: Sleepworking. Yes, a pun. A play on words. But more. I like to think of the portmanteau as the pun's older, wiser, cleverer brother.

#### **Presenting the Portmanteau**

For historical context, many words in common use today started out as a sometimes tentative, sometimes daring portmanteau word.

The term comes from the mind of Lewis Carroll, based on the idea of "two meanings packed up into one word," which in turn stems from the portmanteau — a large travelling case that opened into two compartments. (The portmanteau as a cloak carrier — from the French *porter* meaning to carry and manteau meaning cloak — goes back to the sixteenth century.)

Think of smog (smoke + fog), taxicab (taximeter + cabriolet), clasp (clutch + grasp), motel (motor + hotel), newscast (news + broadcast), brunch (breakfast + lunch). And a shipload of others, with newer portmanteaus — ranging from manbag and nections.

What do you think is the best advertising mathlete to snowmageddon and sharknado — constantly arriving in our zeitgeist.

When you think about it, the portmanteau retising that appeals to you, it's got a big idea. flects the essence of what "creative" is: bringing two or more separate things together to create something new. It's like what Steve Jobs said: "Creativity is just connecting things."

> Things being connected in distinctive, memorable ways happens all around us. For instance, there's that little device called the original iPhone, which first brought together a portable music player and a cell phone and a personal touchscreen computer linked to the internet. That bit of creative connecting has done pretty well.

> Think also of food. Everything we eat — from your grandmother's age-old recipe for chicken soup to that modern morning smoothie — depends on bringing together ingredients creatively. Foodie culture, which has helped make chefs into celebrities and is served by oodles of food content on TV, in books, and online, is all about creative connections.

#### What's the Big Idea?

Which brings me back, folks, to the fun-withfood McDonald's campaign built on the big idea of "sleepworking". The premise — and promise is clear and clever: to avoid the negative effects of "sleepworking" on an empty stomach, start your day off right with breakfast from McDonald's.

Very smart. A universal truth. An insightful strategy. Who can't relate to feeling groggy and unfocused some mornings? Enter McDonald's with a tasty solution. (Of course, unstated but integral to this proposition is a jolt of McDonald's coffee to go along with your breakfast choice. Would you like to make that a combo?)

Savvy marketers like McDonald's use the power of the portmanteau to form strong mnemonic con-

So you're more likely to remember that when McDonald's came out with its new CBO (Chicken Bacon Onion) earlier this year, they married it to a portmanteau tag line: your new cravourite. You're more likely to remember General Mills positioning Cheerios as "the official cereal of dadhood." And you're more likely to remember a feelgood imperative like "Be Troptimistic" for Tropicana orange juice.

Certainly, not every pun achieves the exalted status of distinctive and memorable portmanteau. Many attempts are cheesy and lame and forced — or just tired and overworked clichés. Think of Halloween "spooktacular" promotions and... need I go on?

This past spring I saw a large online travel company focusing on "Spring-tacular" savings. So not all portmanteaus are gems.

## Is Portmanteau the Way to Go?

The portmanteau can be like a form of campaign shorthand. Seeing or hearing that brief and memorable portmanteau reminds people of a campaign's specific message. And those distinctive and meaningful words can help form and maintain a positive general impression of the overall brand too.

When Lewis Carroll introduced the notion of portmanteau words in his 1871 novel Through the Looking-Glass, and What Alice Found *There*, he had Humpty Dumpty commenting on the nonsense poem Jabberwocky, saying: "Slithy' means 'lithe' and slimy'... You see it's like a portmanteau, there are two meanings packed up into one word."

While few of the nonsense words from the short Jabberwocky poem have entered our lexicon — notable exceptions being chortled (chuckled + snorted) and galumphing (galloping + triumphant) - Lewis Carroll might be heartened to see the playful and inventive use of portmanteau words becoming more prominent in today's expanding marketing communications universe. Being remembered for what you've expressed in words is as relevant in today's multidimensional media world as it was in Lewis Carroll's simpler times.

These days, finding the right people with the strategic insight and the creative chops to come up with exceptional portmanteau words to form parts of memorable campaigns is important to brand vitality. Just ask a company like McDonald's. Or better still, pay close attention to what and how they're communicating. By choosing — or creating — the right words, marketing campaigns can deliver excellent results.

In the spirit of the portmanteau, I'm inclined to say even fantabulous results.




