



Right now, it's hit or miss as to whether Clayton would receive a health and safety alert. The community's access to internet and cell service is among the worst in the country. This is motivating a determined group of local citizens to pull together an innovative, community-based initiative to bring better broadband and cell access to the community.

MM2020 is a volunteer-led initiative to enhance broadband throughout Mississippi Mills. The MM2020 Clayton working group has come together to drive better broadband and cell connectivity for the estimated 600 homes in the greater Clayton area. With more than 25 volunteers, the group launched a community survey on internet and cell phone gaps in service. More than 40% of households have already responded.


Survey results point directly to the importance of bringing better connectivity to local businesses and residents. Almost a third of all respondents (29%) operate a home-based business and face economic challenges related to poor internet/cell service. # Barbara Jordan **Uncovering the Artist Within**



#### **Empty Fears**

Given her extensive career as a professional photographer and graphic designer, it surprises me to learn that she only recently has overcome her "fear of painting." Each time she purchased new brushes and paints, they languished on the shelf. After all those years of translating clients' needs into effective graphic designs, photos, videos and art work, why was she intimidated by a blank white canvas facing her? Thoroughly experienced in all aspects of photography, Jordan puts her technical knowledge to good use. Printing on canvas, she produces striking images in a variety of formats. A single flower — a common field daisy — shimmers in the sunlight. With her choice of perspective, the inclusion of three blades of grass, and her large print format she creates a joyous tribute to nature, to spring, to sunshine — guaranteed to brighten a bedroom or an office. Her favourite photo is a dramatic close-up of a stunning blue orchid. Her floral works predicate her answer to one of my standard interview questions: "If you couldn't be an artist, what would you do?" Jordan would be a florist.

Jordan loves architecture, and some of her most eye-catching images feature city scenes. An admirer

When Barbara was a little girl she "lived for the days I took an art class." During high school in Cobourg, her Australian art teacher encouraged her to pursue her arts ambitions. When Jordan applied for the Arts and Design Program at Sheridan College in Oakville, the program was full, and she was asked if she would consider photography instead. She absolutely loved it. She credits her Visual Awareness class with teaching her the most useful thing she learned — how to see.

She got a job right out of school working in the photo lab of a big Toronto firm that specialized in the design and production of large catalogs for major firms. After moving to Winnipeg she loved working in a portrait photographer's studio, and then accepted an offer to work as an industrial photographer for a large firm. That proved to be a very interesting job.



For one commercial video, Barbara was running ahead of a huge farm tractor through winter corn stubble to get the perfect action shot. When she broke through the chest-high Winnipeg snow, she managed to hold her expensive Hasselblad camera over her head until it and she were rescued. She vividly remembers shooting film for a promotional video while strapped into the front seat of a Bell JetRanger helicopter with her feet on the landing skids, jockeying her huge 16mm film camera as they flew across crop fields.

Jordan returned to Toronto and worked as a senior printer in two boutique film labs downtown. After a move to Ottawa (and the birth of her son, Brooks) she did a stint at a National Film Board lab where she continued as a senior printer and supervisor. She was hired away from that job to manage a large private sector lab that had won a government contract for photo services. She has a great story about the time she received a call from Yousuf Karsh from his NYC studio. He was photographing David Rockefeller and was asking for her advice regarding which filter would correct the blue tones in facial shadows.

Next she was hired as a producer by a film and video production company. Between her work ethic and people skills, she surmounted a steep learning curve — "people love to share their knowledge," she told me, "just ask." In 1991 she and her partner, Erik Gustaffson, launched their own company, Bark Productions. Initially producing for film and TV, they branched into graphic design and Barbara became what she said she would be when she was six years old.

#### **Fear of Painting**

In 2008 the couple relocated to their rural log house near Portland, and Erik subsequently became a Captain for Gananoque Boat Line — 1000 Islands Cruises. Jordan continues to captain Bark Productions, and appears to have conquered her fear of facing a blank canvas. When she approached the Cove Inn in Westport in 2014 about displaying her photographs on canvas, she was introduced to the Rideau Lakes Artists' Association. A painting course with Blair Paul of Ottawa provided her with the underpainting method she needed to tackle those intimidating blank canvases. She now paints every week with fellow RLAA artists at Local Colours in Perth.

Not only do the flowers spring up in May — Barbara Jordan will be displaying her photos and acrylic paintings on May 5 and 6 at the Arts Carleton Place Fine Art Show at the Carleton Place Canoe Club (located at 179 John Street), and again on July 14 and 15 during the Rideau Lakes Artists' Association's **Paint the Summer** art show, at the Algonquin College Perth Campus at 7 Craig Street. Drop in and see how rewarding it can be to overcome "painter's block."

# **Art in the Attic —** This is Us!



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# **MMLT: Discover the Wild**

Bob Betcher, MMLT's resident hydrogeologist/geologist, will show participants some marble that was once limestone in a shallow sea but was subsequently uplifted and altered by heat and pressure. The type of marble at cliffLAND is slightly soluble in acidic precipitation and over time has developed Karst dissolution features such as caves and sinkholes, which can form important habitat for bats, snakes and other creatures.

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

# **Getting Serious about Climate Change**

### **Meet Local Green Candidate Anita Payne**

April's ice storm, coupled with major flooding and severe forest fires dominating the news for months on end in 2017, are further evidence that climate change is real. Scientists agree that it's bad and we are responsible, but there is hope. That hope is what inspires Anita Payne to run for the Greens.

"More and more people are getting it, but I really worry when one of the major parties still is not pledging to act on the climate crisis," said Payne, who is running as the Green Party of Ontario candidate in Lanark-Frontenac-Kingston. Promises to abandon efforts to reduce our carbon footprint "are just irresponsible in 2018." The climate crisis

> is "an existential issue that we all should be acting to solve," she adds.

As a volunteer with Citizens' Climate Lobby, Payne has pushed for the implementation of a revenue-neutral carbon fee and dividend: a fee or tax on all fossil fuels at their source and a dividend to help Ontarians deal with rising costs associated with the fee. The fee is an incentive to spur deep retrofitting of buildings, providing local jobs and investment in renewable energy. The use of fossil fuels would decrease as seen in the BC experience.



The Liberals' Green Energy Act was "the right idea" but the implementation was "way too top-down". Instead of handing the job to large corporations, wind and solar power needs to be done at the local level, ensuring local benefit and local buy-in, says Payne.

Spending billions of our tax dollars to upgrade outdated technology like nuclear power is also an issue for Greens. Payne also notes the growing awareness about the environmental impact of "fracked"

The future "is and has to be" renewable energy, says Payne.

Greens also have strong social, health, financial and justice polices as seen in the Green Vision document Committee and served as president of her lake as-<gpo.ca/vision>. It focuses on three pillars: Jobs, People and Planet.

Anita Payne is no stranger to the political arena, having run locally for the riding in the 2015 federal election, and as a provincial candidate in past elections in Belleville, Lindsay and Stratford, where she lived before moving back to the Perth area several



> On a more sombre note, on Thursday, May 24, you can come hear author Peter J. Usher share the incredible tale of his cousin, RCAF Airman Joey Jacobson, and sign copies of his new book Joey Jacobson's War — A Jewish Canadian Airman in the Second World War.

Usher explains that: "In the spring of 1940, Canada began training thousands of young men to man Britain's bomber force in the war against Nazi Germany. Nearly half of them were killed or captured within a year of their arrival. This is the story of how one of those men, Joey Jacobson, my mother's favourite cousin, was transformed from a raw recruit to a deadly serious yet idealistic warrior. From his own letters and diaries, I have pieced together his account of why he enlisted, his training as a navigator and bomb-aimer in Western Canada, and his service in Bomber Command at the sharp end of the air war over Europe. Joey Jacobson's War also relates how the fatal crash of his aircraft in Holland in January 1942 galvanized local resistance to the German occupation.





# **Talking to the Tomatoes**

A local writers' group that I belong to had a fascinating discussion recently about our relationship with nature and the profound effect that growing vegetables has on us.

One poet talked about how her grandfather used to sit quietly in a chair beside his small patch of tomatoes. When family asked him what he was doing, he replied that he was "talking to the tomatoes".

While recent scientific research has demonstrated that plants respond to the human voice and can communicate in many ways, I suspect that the interaction has much stronger benefits for the human participant. Getting our hands in the soil and nurturing plants has tremendous benefits.

With peril we ignore our "animal" side and our deep connection to the earth. While not denigrating the benefits of mindfulness exercises, I have found that a half-hour in the garden takes me away from the craziness in my mind and brings me clarity, objectiveness and a sense of peace and contentment.

While a solitary pursuit of gardening has salutary benefits, gardening collaboratively can multiply those benefits. We are very fortunate in Almonte to have the Neighbourhood Tomato Community Gardening Program. It is a phenomenon that owes much to the support of the Mills Community Support Corporation and to the dozens of committed

volunteers in our community who toil long and hard every summer.

The Tomato started in 2011 with the construction of a few raised gardening boxes at group homes and at the hospital. This was followed in 2012 by the planting of 75 apple and pear trees in the two towns and three hamlets that comprise the municipality of Mississippi Mills. In 2013 more raised beds for growing vegetables were installed at many locations around the municipality, including several at Augusta Street Park, and an educational component

was launched. In 2014 a 6,000-square-foot community vegetable garden was created in Augusta Street Park. Since then, improvements have included a large shed, a path through the garden that connects with the bridge and the street, and a large berm planted with edible shrubs.

On a broader scope, the Neighbourhood Tomato has built strong links to community gardening programs in Carp and Carleton Place. Testifying to the vibrancy of these programs, all plots are committed; but do not despair — all gardens welcome volunteers for their collaborative plots and if there are enough gardeners on waiting lists, I suspect that expansion plans will be approved.

The Augusta Street Park Garden has 28 private plots and 12 plots for the Food Bank that are gardened collaboratively by volunteers. Contact Gerda Franssen at 257–7155 if you wish to help with the Food Bank plots. A **spring clean-up and garden prepara**

tion day is scheduled for Saturday, May 5 from 10AM to 3PM. Light refreshment will be served.

The Carleton Place Community Garden has 20 low-rise beds and 6 raised beds that are individual plots which are free for anyone in the community. The "community" portion is the sharing of ideas, hints, labour (if requested/offered), seeds, and perhaps helping to make the whole garden a bit of an oasis. The Hunger Stop (food bank) has five large beds. There is also a lockable shed to store tools and water barrels for watering. The Carp community garden has 20 beds. Four are waist-high raised beds for those with mobility challenges. Of the 20, 14 are private beds and 6 are collaborative gardens where the veggies are harvested and delivered to the West Carleton

Food Access Centre. All plots are reserved this season, but they are always looking for volunteers to help garden the collaborative beds and to help with harvesting and delivering to the food bank. Any interested volunteers can email <michellerehkopf@rogers.com>.

#### **Great Veggie Grow-off**

The Great Veggie Grow-off is a very exciting initiative created by the Neighbourhood Tomato in 2014 as a friendly challenge to see which com-

munity could donate the greatest amount of fresh produce to the Food Bank. For the fifth year, all nine Lanark communities are again being challenged to grow and donate to their local food bank. Presently all four food banks (Carleton Place, Lanark, Perth and Smiths Falls) take donations of freshly grown produce. They have been asked to weigh and record the community of origin of locally grown food from May 1 until the final weigh-in at Thanksgiving. Last year 7,000 pounds of fresh produce was donated. Bragging rights will be given to the community that donates the most locally grown food as well as to the community with the most freshly grown food donated per person. Of course, the big winners are always our community's food banks.

The kick-off to this year's Great Veggie Grow-Off takes place on Tuesday, May 1 at noon at the Friendship Oven in front of the Almonte Library.





# **Springs into Action!**

#### men make quilts / women make sculpture

The exhibition title is slightly tongue-incheek and somewhat provocative, but its irony rings true in the case of a new show at General Fine Craft in Almonte from May 8 to June 17. The two featured artists are no strangers to working outside of the norm, engaging the viewer and experimenting with ideas and materials in unique ways.

**Robert Pauly** is a collector and a maker of art and objects who lives in Clayton, Ontario. Over a lengthy career, he has created everything from sculpture to wearable art. His curiosity and a healthy mix of respect for tradition and irreverence for the status quo shine through in a selection of his quilts in this exhibition.

Robert's approach is playful: using vintage fabrics and vibrant colour combinations, he alters traditional patterns with unusually beautiful results. His "postage stamp" quilts are made of thousands of one-inch squares painstaking sewn into bedcover size. Other quilts feature row upon row of colourful stripes that give an overall dazzling visual effect.

The medium of choice for Ottawa's **Cynthia O'Brien** is clay. She has used it to create functional, non-functional and sculptural objects for over thirty years. She has also explored its more ephemeral qualities through art installations and live performance pieces.

This show features her *Father Series* of sculptural objects hand-built with black clay. They are complicated 3-dimensional constructions full of nuance and contrast. Cynthia's approach to making them is unique: she imagines them first as interior spaces filled with emotion, roots of her family tree which then burst outward energetically.

# Mudds' Guys and Dolls is a Delight!



### you been on stage together before this show?

Julie: We met in high school and were very good university and we reconnected. We both did theatre or we are getting ready to be in another scene. separately — I did some in high school and so did he, but I was three years ahead so we didn't have a lot of crossover. I did some community theatre musicals when at university, and Calvin did some community theatre outside of high school as well.



Finally, spring is in the air — and also Weeta- practice. Carlo Petrini articulated the movement's to the Perth food scene, and word of mouth the Café is not in the downtown core. Skilled detective work produces an address and a is not an issue; bad news is one is not likely to get there without knowing the way.

More good news — the effort is rewarded! We learned how to get there (read on), we went, and we plan to return. Lunch at Picnic (eat there or take out) can be chosen from an interesting list posted on the wall. If you are early enough, the list will not sport multiple "sold out" tags. The open kitchen allows the curious to watch a small staff assemble orders into presentations that are as pleasing to the eye as they are to the palate. Everything here is fresh and freshly made. Wait times are short; Slow Food meets fast service! Weetabix is impressed and investigates further. An interview with the founder and proprietor follows, and not surprisingly there is a lot behind the scenes — notwithstanding an open kitchen.

A former teacher, Jordan Kennie has a deep love of food in all respects, and food preparation is an essential part of her life. With young children, and prodded by friends, she transitioned from the front of the classroom to a role where both learning and teaching are integrated with her production activities. She is serious about Slow Food — both

bix who springs into action to chase down three interconnected defining principles as GOOD, a hot tip. Picnic Café is a welcome addition CLEAN and FAIR, and memorably stated that: "It's possible to change the world even while preserving works. However, directions are needed since the concept of the right of pleasure." Weetabix's favorite Petrini quote is: "An environmentalist who is not a gastronomer is sad." And Picnic is, above all, phone number. Good news is that parking a happy place where, in the words of Alice Waters: "things taste the way they are".

Although Kennie did not train as a chef (and is careful to describe herself as a cook who loves food), she decided to shift from teaching in order to have more flexible time for her children. A food-centric lifestyle led her to develop a home-based catering practice. One thing led to several others, and soon the business side of the practice was encroaching on other aspects of her family life. A developing business is not dissimilar to a child in some respects and makes its own demands. After several cycles of planning she realized that despite major challenges ahead she would be "very sad" if she did not "just go for it". Kennie does not do sad by choice, and so Picnic Café opened last September.

The choice of location of Picnic interests Weetabix since it does not capture pedestrian or casual tourist traffic. Turns out that there is a personal connection to a nearby business at several levels (Weetabix does not refer readers to physiotherapists, but it is comforting to know that if one is needed either before or after lunch, one could simply go next door). Aside from the synergy and traffic, available parking and ease of access for loading (Picnic offers a full range of catering services), the space itself facilitated the development of an open concept kitchen and seating as a philosophy (see www.slowfood.com) and as a area. It is bright and done in a simple modern style

> that provides a pleasant setting for dining as well as good work space. The large workspace helps organize efficient flow, and staff works in view of customers. This provides a show or background depending on one's

> Kennie is part of the surprisingly small crew and manages from the floor. Her team is well coordinated and clearly enjoys working together. All of them cooperate in preparation and delivery of the orders. The short but varied menu is posted on large signboards and orders are taken at counter-side where take-out items are delivered. those who either fancy efficiency or live with time constraints. If you elect to eat in, get your table first as the place gets busy and standing with a bowl, utensils and a beverage requires more than average coordination. Limited seating availability is the result of demand — and with good reason. But fear not: once your order is in, food will be delivered promptly. Everything is to order; Slow Food but not slow food.

So, what about the food? Weetabix is, after all, hungry, and one of the perks of this gig is that it requires practical research. Forewarned as you now are too, a table was reserved. We (party of four) arrived in time to beat the noon-hour rush. After a guick look round, selections were made which included a special order and items from the menu. All showed significant influence of other cultures — notably Korean, Mediterranean, Indian and Japanese — and dishes are attractively presented on deep bowls. Visuals are an important part of eating and Kennie pays attention to presentation as well as content. As a dedicated food taster, Weetabix indulged further with a simple egg salad sandwich and is happy to report that it was an excellent example of "deliciously simple and simply delicious". My companions were very pleased with their bowls, and in what may have been an excess of zeal, Weetabix scored a gluten-free specialty of Picnic's creation — a savoury sweet potato bake. Very savoury it was too, a good companion for a glutenfree coffee from Reunion Island Coffee Roasters.

Picnic Café <picnicperth.com> is located at 1865 Rogers Road in Perth and is open from 7AM to 4PM Monday through Friday (closed weekends). Staff is well-treated and holiday closings are anticipated, so call ahead (466–0743) to reserve / order / avoid disappointment. Of course, eating there can achieve all of that. ### **Electric Vehicle Pioneers are Paving the Road for the Future**

The need for electric vehicle technology is growing exponentially as the importance the University of Waterloo Elecof reducing greenhouse gas emissions is increasingly legislated. The obvious solution to this global problem is electric vehicles. Electric vehicles (EVs) are more energy-efficient, use green-sourced fuels for charging, emit no pollutants into the air, and are quieter.

The next generation of engineers and mechanics need to have an understanding of EVs, and that's where the Waterloo Electric Vehicle Challenge comes in. The EV Challenge tasks teams of high school students with designing and building allelectric vehicles that are tested in an annual endurance competition. Teams participate in two races, plus an engineering design competition. This challenge gives students an amazing opportunity to develop skills in engineering, automotive, communication, organization, networking, selling, marketing and teamwork.

The EV Pioneers is the only high school team in the entire Ottawa Valley competing er-Aided Design (CAD) sub-team. in this year's University of Waterloo EV Challenge. # Welcoming Wildlife

now seeing lots of spring birds. As early as April 7 I spotted an American kestrel near Blakeney. And as soon as there were pockets of water in the ice the spring ducks started to show up, including both hooded and common mergansers, buffleheads, common goldeneyes, wood ducks, and for a very short time a ring-necked duck and a greater scaup. I suspect we will see even more traffic on the river as most of the northern lakes are just now opening up.

Many songbirds are close behind — from warblers to swallows and flycatchers — and with that in mind our yard preparations and installations of nesting boxes, platforms and new barn swallow nesting cups are in full swing. More than ever, yard planning and planting must be geared toward wildlife. For years now, the focus of the gardening industry has drawn us away from a diverse yard habitat that supports nature, towards exotic plants and shrubs with vast amounts of lawn commonly referred to a monoculture.

Creating valuable habitat for birds and countless other species of insects and wildlife is beneficial to the ecosystem as a whole — we are nature and

While gardening is certainly a big aspect of this, there are many other complementary elements that can be added to almost any yard that will take your habitat creation game to a whole new level.

#### **Bird Feeders**

Yes, that's right, bird feeders are obviously a vital **Pollinator Gardening** element of a backyard oasis for birds and other wild- One feature of backyard habitat projects that is of

#### Snags

Snags, also known as standing dead or dying trees, are great sources of food and shelter. Insect-eating birds can often be found traversing downed trees searching for their next meal, and many cavity- and ground-nesting species will take up residence during the spring season. In addition, snags also provide great shelter to many small mammals.

#### **Rain Barrels**

Recycling water is awesome for the environment — no two ways about that. In addition to allowing for an alternative to your home's garden hose, these barrels can provide a reliable source of water for many species of birds as well.

#### **Brush Piles**

Much like snags, these small piles of brush make for either a great hiding place, a nest, or both! Take a closer look around brush piles in the woods or around your neighborhood and you will often be treated to birds flitting about.

#### **Compost Heaps**

Compost (or, as some refer to it, "controlled decomposition"), is absolutely fantastic for our natural world. Considering that landfills are overrun by compostable materials, starting a small heap in your yard is a step in the right direction.

In addition to the environmental advantages, compost heaps are full of wildlife — including insects, snails and slugs — a perfect combination of valuable food for our backyard birds. Then, a great next step is:

Incorporating features like pollinator gardens, brush heaps and snags (standing dead or dying trees) into your landscaping can provide important habitat and food sources for local birds and other wildlife!

outdoor enthusiasts, many of us are aware of the act of pollination and its importance to our natural world — something I am extremely passionate about. The fact of the matter is that roughly 75 percent of all flowering plants rely on animal and insect pollinators — of which many are birds such as hummingbirds and small mammals such as bats.

The first rule for any backyard habitat or garden creation is to always use native plants and grasses only. The introduction of invasive and non-native plants can in some cases prove fatal to a number of insects, birds and mammals that call our area home. Secondly, you will want to use a wide range of native flowers. Each different flower suits a different group of pollinators and the more variety your garden has, the better it is for everyone involved. A good starting point is to choose a number of flowers of different shapes and sizes (thus accommodating as many different pollinators as possible) and choosing plants that bloom throughout the entire season to keep the cycle going for as long as possible. Our native grasses and wildflower patches bloom throughout the season with a variety of flowers and grasses that birds use all year. The Gilligallou Bird YouTube channel has several videos on this subject.
