



Local Professor to Lecture in Germany

A chance encounter with a research paper written by Warren Thorngate, Almonte resident and Carleton University Emeritus Professor of Psychology, has led to a prestigious invitation to lecture at the Max Planck Institute of Human Development in Berlin, Germany. In 1980, Professor Thorngate published a report of a computer simulation comparing the quality of decisions made in different ways. At the time, the article was largely overlooked, and Thorngate admits he has moved on considerably since he wrote it. Thorngate recently learned, however, that Ralph Hertwig, a German professor of psychology at the Institute, has been using the article in his post-grad classes for decades. Hertwig's students had questions regarding the content, and after several email exchanges, he invited Professor Thorngate to come to Berlin, meet the students and present two lectures on two of his more recent interests: new ways of finding patterns in data, and the pathologies of contests and competitions — a topic that has relevance to contests of any sort — everything from lotteries to job application selections.


Professor Thorngate is no stranger to international lectures and conferences. In fact, he says he has been busier since he retired than when he was teaching! He regularly teaches at the Institute of Cognitive Science Studies in Tehran, presenting his lectures on Skype for most of his three-month courses, and in person for the final two weeks. He has been involved in educational projects in Iran for nearly 25

years, and his experiences would fill a book on their own. He has also lectured at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh, the University of Surrey in England, and in St. Petersburg, Moscow, Melbourne, Warsaw and other venues.

Professor Thorngate has given several lectures for the **Learning in Almonte** series, and is due to present again in January when he will give a course on assessing the news: what's real, what's fake. His courses incorporate many aspects of social psychology that influence daily living, and they are always fascinating and always engaging.

The Canadian Wilderness

Canadians love white birch trees and so does Karl Kischel. His stunning portrait of a birch just won the "most popular" designation for the theme "My Canada" at the Expressions of Art Show in Carp. > It was there he was "discovered" by a couple from Paris who were selling art supplies in Ottawa. They spotted the oil painting of a pheasant flying through grain fields that he did when he was eleven years old, and immediately supplied him with a wonderful range of paints, brushes, and even a plein air paintbox. One day when he was a sixteen-year-old attending Glebe Collegiate High School, he was sitting outdoors sketching in pencil when the owner of a gallery on Sussex Street asked him to exhibit his

Two days after completing a two-year commercial no bounds, and he achieves effects that range from art course at Algonquin College, Kischel was hired by Bell Canada to work as a graphic designer for their Yellow Pages. Twenty-five years later when they gave him a "choice" between relocating to Montreal or Toronto, he guit. He and his wife were not about to abandon their home in the country. They had bought



it on the winter evening they first saw it, and they were not leaving. Karl says the best thing that ever happened to him was meeting his wife — she worked night shifts as a nurse, and he was stay-at-home dad to their sons so they could grow up in nature — the perfect place.

When I asked him if he had a favourite painting, he was stumped for a moment. Then he broke into a smile and said there were two reappearing a moment later with two portraits of his sons as youths. His favourite recent painting is of the magnificent sunset he and his sons enjoyed on their last canoe trip together on Radiant Lake in Algonquin Park. Kischel believes there is an art gene, and that his three sons have inherited it. On his Facebook account there are several videos shot by the son who is a filmmaker. Another is a painter, and his third son chose architecture over fine arts. When I asked Karl what he would do if he couldn't be an artist, he came up totally blank. He loves to paint.

Follow Your Instincts

On Facebook, Karl writes that he "is always searching for those moments when light, colour and form come together to orchestrate a spiritualism inherent in our great Canadian landscape." Like Tom Thomson and members of our famous Canadian Group of Seven, Kischel is an avid outdoorsman. He too is drawn to landscapes that feature symbols of our national character — "models of resolve against the elements," as Arthur Lismer described Thomson's trees in The West Wind.


Whether Kischel is channelling these iconic predecessors, or whether it is simply coincidence, he has noticed some unintentional parallels between their outdoor explorations and his. He discovered by accident that, while exploring, he had been painting in the same spot that A. Y. Jackson had rendered one of his plein air canvases. Another time he got lost and ended up on the road where Tom Thomson had painted, and last week when he was at Six Mile Lake in the Township of Georgian Bay, he learned that he was staying in a cabin right next to where David Milne had stayed.

Coincidence or not, it is the result of following his own counsel: "In these troubled times, we should be reflecting on nature, being soothed and relaxed by its calmness, appreciating its balance... and learning how to thrive."



An Hysterical, Historical Fundraiser for the Pakenham Library

"What if you live in a place that's so small, it doesn't have a history?"

That's the naïve assessment of Pakenham's history, voiced by Jesse— a character in A Peak at Pakenham who has to write a 1000-word assignment about her hometown for Ms. Kaddidlehopper's class. Little do she and her buddy Terry know, but when they enlist the help of Jesse's Grandma, a veritable mountain of fascinating information about the village is unearthed! Fortunately, Gram's magic powers are able to conjure up not only people from Pakenham's illustrious past, but also a talking mountain, a singing quarry, dancing beluga whales, and a stage full of other characters who truly bring history to life. They are put through their paces by director/choreographer Kris Riendeau, helped to sound exquisite by musical director Cathy Giles, costumed to the nines by Carol Mortimer, and supported by a whole slew of other amazing volunteers.

A Peak at Pakenham is the latest musical penned by Fern Martin (whose recent productions include the stories of local notables James Naismith and R. Tait McKenzie, as well as *Trashdance* and *Quilts from Hell*). Peak has a particular purpose, which is to raise funds for the expansion of the Pakenham Library. But even its author was surprised at how much she didn't know about the little village. "I have lived most of my life in Mississippi Mills — the last 42 years on a farm near Pakenham," Fern explains. "Before writing this I thought I had a pretty good handle on our local history. I was wrong! The discoveries I made and am continuing to make have been astonishing, heartbreaking and delightful."

A Peak at Pakenham will be performed at the Almonte Old Town Hall at 7:30PM on November 15, 16, 17 and 18, and also at 2PM on the 18th. 



The Pie of Life (at Tea & Cake)

Gwendolyn Neelin is on a mission chosen calling: "Feeding people is what I love". **Tea & Cake** (formerly known as Robin's Nest) is her bold step onto the stage of food service; and butterscotch pie is butterscotch pie. Weetabix will explain in due course, but first a message for those

looking for a traditional tea room in the UK style; look no further and book a table for a light, or not so light, refreshment. Call ahead if you go at lunchtime, because seating is limited and you might want to reserve a piece of the butterscotch pie too.

Weetabix did not reserve space but did arrive early enough to get a table. The small room is the embodiment of "cozy" in the style of many rural tea rooms still found in the British countryside — relaxing and offering visual distractions such as a display shelf of china pieces and an interesting selection of graphite sketches by an artist named Michael Neelin. Service is attentive and very friendly. The menu offers breakfast until 11:30AM and a clear and simple pathway to a satisfying meal, but the real action is on the menu board where daily offerings of soup, specials and desserts are posted. There is also an intriguing coda in italics suggesting one enquire about take-away orders including "from scratch pies", which begs questions about the nature and flavour of scratch. And there is butterscotch pie.

As the youngest of four sisters, Gwento find a venue to pursue her dolyn got to do the dishes... and so decided to pursue a career in stage management and theatre. An accidental gig helping out at a coffee shop in Montreal redirected her and she decided to redirect rapidly — moving from the service side to the stove side. A course in professional baking led her to a year at Chatsworth House <chatsworth.org/house> located, appropriately, near Bakewell in Devonshire where side rambles acquainted her with British tea rooms. Falling in love with a style is as good a way as any to make a basic decision. When she returned to Canada she expected it would take ten years or so to "have my own little shop", so she began a catering venture.

> The food service industry may be a calling but it is not generally a place to build a capital base; it is also demanding in terms of both physical and emotional energy and every day is show time. Success requires more than usual initiative, and so it is not surprising that in short order Gwendolyn started to research possible locations. She describes Almonte as "the ideal place to live in Ontario" and by fortunate coincidence found an ad for a "going concern" that was a good match of scale and style. An agreement followed, and with the help of the Business Development Centre and Futurepreneur, loans were secured and she became the new owner of Tea & Cake. Since the previous owner did not want it widely known that she wanted to exit, an established client base came with the business. On the downside, customers were surprised at the change (literally over a

single weekend) and they had expectations. Fortunately, the transition package included recipe books. And butterscotch pie.

Ironically, Gwendolyn is not a huge dessert fan but she is a baker — Weetabix is slightly confused by this distinction, but no matter, she can certainly make desserts and she confesses (without duress) to a particular fondness for sticky toffee sauce, which can be found as an integral part of the sticky pudding or simply sampled on its own. Lemon curd — another English favourite — is not overly sweet, but it is deliciously lemony and can be enjoyed with a light scone or in a lemon pie. For somewhat dark and complex reasons Weetabix did not dare the lemon pie but tried the curd with a scone. That left him with an empty pie hole and vulnerable to an ambush by the butterscotch pie. It was lurking on the daily dessert offering list and is, according to my server, "the famous one" and a constant on the list. The recipe goes back to Jennifer the original owner of the restaurant (then the Victorian Teacup) — who is credited with the invention of this species of butterscotch pie which has become a staple; a tradition not to be messed with and a justly popular item.

Weetabix confesses to having been in search of a worthy butterscotch pie for some time so it really was a matter of destiny. Permission from your cardiologist is advised but not required. Rather than attempt to write some food porn we will simply note that a universal mythic archetype of butterscotch pie finds its expression at Tea & Cake. Be warned. Preliminary research

suggests the possibility of addiction and Weetabix must investigate further.

Life is short, and eating dessert first practically compels one to have two desserts. In between, note that Gwendolyn is a soup maven, and (especially as cooler weather approaches) one should check out the daily offering. Weetabix makes a generic recommendation here and notes that the butternut squash/blue cheese soup should be a repeat item. Along with a piece of a light and savoury quiche, lunch was enjoyed; bracketed by butterscotch pie it may not have qualified as a light lunch, but it certainly was satisfying.

To paraphrase Dennis Lee: Butterscotch Pie, Butterscotch Pie If I don't get some, I think I'm gonna die. Give away the green grass, give away the sky, But don't give away my Butterscotch Pie.

Having a Glass on Glen Isle

In the small towns and villages of the Ottawa Valley, it's often said that you can't throw a paintbrush without hitting a talented artist or craftsperson (or a stand-up bass without hitting a musician, but those are a bit harder to toss). As a result, the area is now home to numerous galleries and studio tours, and you can find gorgeous art throughout the year. But what if you are feeling the creative urge yourself?

Well you're in luck once again, as it turns out! In addition to a growing number of artists who offer lessons from their homes or studios, several new creative spaces have opened up over the past years. People of all ages gather at Art & Class in Perth, at the MERA Schoolhouse in McDonalds Corners and at J.B. Arts in Almonte for lessons in a variety of media, or head over to the Almonte Potters Guild for some creative mudslinging. More re-

to teach workshops on topics like kiln casting, bead making, photography in glass, and exploring expression in drawing & glass.

TheHumm caught up with Jennifer to find out more about her studio and its move from downtown Almonte to the banks of the Mississippi River fresh out of the beginner course is to just rent studio between Appleton and Carleton Place.

What drew you to locate your glass studio beside your home, and where exactly is Glen Isle?

Jennifer Kelly: Recurring issues with the commercial space we were in led me to choose a location that I have control over. I now have a much better space for everyone who visits, located on the Mississippi River. Now we welcome everyone into the studio space, the main floor of the house and the outdoor waterfront. It has been so lovely and peaceful. We are located between Carleton Place and Almonte and only twenty minutes from Kanata down Highway 7.

What are some good ways for people to find out whether this medium is "for them"?

The best bet is to participate in one of the many beginner workshops or parties. Individuals can sign up for a single workshop or book a private session to make a pendant, sun-catcher or dish. For a minimum of three people (maximum 9) we book the studio for private parties. Each person chooses the project they want from a selection of samples, so everyone creates something unique. The parties are extremely popular and so much fun!

Glass is a beautiful medium that is relatively easy to work with, but it does require some pretty specialized materials and equipment. What will people find in your studio?

When I first decided to offer "studio time" to people who completed the beginner fusing course, my motivation was to create an enthusiastic glass community. However, I quickly learned that there is a lot of demand for studio time for very practical reasons. I have accumulated a very large selection of equipment and tools (and I'm still adding). This means that there is welcome emails at <currentworksofglass@gmail.com> zero investment in tools for any students who practice or calls to 859–0100. here. We have six kilns, a sandblasting set-up, cold

cently, the tiny island of Glen Isle welcomed **Current** working equipment, large worktables and all kinds of Works of Glass, where artist Jennifer Kelly offers specialized tools. We also have the largest selection of fused glass classes and also welcomes guest artists in fusible glass and enamels in the region. This is a very healthy addiction, so we have to keep it fed!

Once someone becomes familiar with the basics, what else do you offer?

There are many advanced technique courses available at the studio. However, my advice to anyone time and play with the techniques they just learned. The basics course covers the first steps for many different techniques so there is a lot you can do with just that information. Many students spend the next year returning to the studio to create their own art based on that knowledge. I am always in the studio to answer questions and help if needed.

What's your favourite aspect of teaching art, as opposed to creating it yourself?

I have been passionate about glass for the last forty-nine years, and it thrills me every time I meet someone who shares that passion. When someone creates their first glass piece the reaction is priceless. Teaching often inspires me to push further in my own work as well. It challenges me to keep experimenting with new techniques.

Have you got any special events or offerings leading up to the holiday season?

We have a few dates for holiday ornament workshops and we have our first "Couples Night" in November. Individuals can book time to come in to make an ornament with no previous experience necessary. With a minimum of three people an ornament party or one of our year-round parties makes for a great holiday outing.

How can people find out more, register for a class or workshop, or book a party?

It is great for visitors to see the studio space and examples of what we do. I am often teaching and hosting private parties, so visits must be booked by appointment please. We have a website that is always getting new courses added and has descriptions of all our current courses: <currentworksofglass.com>. I also


Rowland Leather to Close after 28 Years

It is no small feat to keep a creative studio in operation for forty years, but Merrickville's Michael Rowland has done just that. Rowland creates elegant and durable leather goods and has built a loyal following of customers in Canada and around the world. In 1989, he opened Rowland Leather in Merrickville. However, all good things must come to an end. After 28 years, Rowland Leather's doors will close this fall.

Since 1974, Michael Rowland has been making gorgeous leather handbags, innovative backpacks, and designer flight bags. When he first opened Rowland Leather, Merrickville was very quiet, home to only a few restaurants and stores. Initially Rowland only had his own work in the shop but gradually he added products from other Canadian producers, such as Garneau slippers (made in Quebec), Keldon belts and Tilley hats (made in Toronto), as well as other leather products from around the world. Rowland Leather has attracted customers with an eye for timeless design and quality materials.

In 2011, Rowland made the trip of a lifetime when he was invited to Iqaluit by the Nunavut Crafts Council to share his knowledge and expertise with seamstresses from across Nunavut. Skilled at making beautiful and practical garments out of sealskin and fur, the women were keen to round out their repertoire by learning how to work with their leather to produce bags. Rowland chronicled his journey in a beautifully rendered book called *Igaluit 2011*, which is on display at Rowland Leather.

Michael Rowland's unstoppable creativity led him, in 2013, to open luxurious guest suites above his store; he is the designer-owner of the Merrickville Guest Suites <merrickvillesuites.ca> boutique hotel, which will remain open. The Suites offer a location that visitors can come to for relaxation and comfort while they enjoy the artistic creativity that Merrickville is known for. He designed the suites and worked with several local tradespeople and artists to create a wonderful space for guests to spend a night, a weekend, or a week. 





January 27 - Amanda Rheaume

It's A Wonderful Mississippi Mills Life

Puppets Up! Adapts Another Christmas Classic

Hot on the heels of last year's wildly successful, sold-out adaptation of Dickens' *A Christmas Carol*, Puppets Up! will once again bring their magical touch to a muchloved Christmas tale.

It's A Wonderful Mississippi Mills Life is a comic, slightly naughty adaptation of the classic Christmas story of a man who has sacrificed for others all his life. In a pit of depression when his world seems about to come crashing down, George Bailey despairs that the whole world would be better off if he'd never been born. His guardian angel Clarence gives him a rare gift: the chance to see the impact he has on the world in ways he can never imagine.

"What we do to create these shows is lock playwright Allan Martin in a room with nothing but a supply of licorice spice tea until he comes up with an adaptation that is faithful to the original story, hilariously funny, shot through with clever topical references, and leavened

with sweetness and original touches that make it a thoroughly entertaining tale for the Christmas season," says Puppets Up! founder and Artistic Director Noreen Young. "Fortunately, Allan works well with tea."

It's A Wonderful Mississippi Mills Life features a single "live" actor, David Frisch, who plays the central character George Bailey. All the other characters in the story are played by seven puppeteers (including Young) who animate 48 puppet likenesses of local figures, which she has built over the years. Each puppet is costumed in custom-made, period dress by renowned costume designer, Almonte's Ingrid Harris.

Featured among the puppets is CBC radio's gardening guru, Ed Lawrence, as the angel Clarence, animated by Noreen Young and voiced by Lawrence himself

Preparation for the show began in late August and September, when a small group of the actors and director Catherine Clark held table readings of the first drafts of Martin's adaptation.

"The table-read atmosphere leads to a lot of improvising among the actors," Martin says. "I have a welcoming attitude about improv. My feeling is: If it makes the show better, let's try it."

In October, the company began preparing the final version of the show. "It's so much fun to do this, to play opposite puppets," Frisch says. "It's almost like the Muppets. The puppeteers are amazing. They make the puppets come to life."


Young says she hopes to establish the Puppets Up! show as a Christmas tradition for Mississippi Mills, Lanark County, and the Ottawa Valley.



A Capital History

David Mulholland's novels illustrate that it's not necessary to set stories in what are thought of as "exotic places" — there are excellent stories right here in the Ottawa Valley.

The Arnprior-raised, Ottawa-residing author's first novel, *McNab* (2006), is about the 16-year struggle between McNab Township's settlers and Chief Archibald McNab who almost succeeded in imposing the Scottish feudal system. His second novel, DUEL (2009), tells the story of the fatal duel between law students Robert Lyon and John Wilson that took place in Perth on June 13, 1833. His newest novel, Chaudière Falls (2016), is based upon the founding of our National Capital Region, and how Ottawa became our nation's capital.

But don't call it historical fiction. "Unlike most authors of historical fiction, I don't try to hide my research," Mulholland says. "It's out front, including key dates; I think 'dramatized history' is a more precise term."

It took the author almost eight years of research and writing to complete Chaudière Falls. Narrated in the present tense, the story begins on March 7, 1800, when Philemon Wright, a farmer from Woburn, Massachusetts, arrives in Hull Township. The tale ends on September 1,1860, when Queen Victoria's son Prince Albert Edward lays the cornerstone for Canada's Parliament Buildings on Barrack Hill.

"That's the 'dramatized history' component," Mulholland says. "The 'novel' component is the story of Jedediah Jansen, who is ten years old when his family arrives with Wright's party. Although integrated with the machinations of the timber and sawn lumber industries, his personal story is entirely fictional."

So that readers wouldn't be overwhelmed by the length, the author divided the story into seven parts.

Part One describes the challenges faced by Philemon Wright's settlers while carving out a farming community amidst dense forest. Wright does not want to be in the timber trade, but Britain is at war with Napoleon's France, and the British navy is in dire need of lumber to build ships. Wright's reckless ambition plunges his company and the eponymous village of Wrightstown into ruinous debt. Today, we are still dealing with the outcome of Wright's first encounter with the Algonquin tribe living on the land.

As an adolescent, Jed Jansen is confused and frustrated by his yearnings for Wright's daughter Abbie. He learns the timber business from Braddish Billings, founder of Gloucester Township, starts his own company, marries another girl, and is overwhelmed when his life begins to unravel.

Part Two is about the building of the Rideau Canal under Lieutenant-Colonel John By. The Commanding Royal Engineer (CRE) divides the settlement into Upper Town and Lower Town. The civilian population resents By's authority, and with the Upper Canada government refusing to confer legal status on the village, the tribal mix of Scots, Brits, Canadiens, and Irish explodes into ethnic and religious violence. Bytown teeters on the brink of anarchy, and its lawless reputation spreads throughout British North America and the eastern United States.

In Part Three, unemployed Irish navvies — known as Shiners — are hired by Peter Aylen, an unscrupulous nightmare has both sides wanting a permanent timberman who leads them in attacking Canadien lumbermen, wreaking havoc in Lower Town, and unimaginable public displays of debauchery. One veteran of the Napoleonic wars says the carnage on the streets reminds him of bloody fields of battle in France.

Meanwhile, a tragedy in Jed Jansen's life adds more stress to his already shaky marriage, and although he lives several miles south of Bytown, the violence being perpetrated by the Shiners finally catches up to him.

Part Four delves into the reunification of the Canadas, and relocation of the capital from Toronto to Kingston. Britain's condescending attitude towards colonials causes frustration and anger that erupts into political violence whose consequences bring Bytown into the running to be named the capital.

While Upper Town's Scottish elite attempt to gain legal status for the expanding village, and the passing of Philemon Wright places his company's is available at <davidmulholland.ca>.

financial burden on the shoulders of his sons, Jed Jansen struggles to cope with the volatility of both the timber trade and his personal relationships.

In Part Five, the provincial government finally recognizes Bytown as a legal municipality. The capital moves from Kingston to Montréal, where one key event alters Canada's future in ways still being felt today. In Lower Town, the riot known as "Stony Monday" remains a part of Ottawa's legacy. A coterie of Tories contrive to be annexed by the United States, and a chance encounter changes Jed Jansen's life forever.

Part Six has the British government scrambling to keep the colony from again splitting in two. To appease Canadiens in Lower Canada, and Englishspeaking Canadians in Upper Canada, the seat-ofgovernment alternates every four years between Toronto and Ville de Québec. This administrative capital. But where? The colonial government finally relents and passes legislation that changes Bytown into the city of Ottawa.

Part Seven sees the colonial capital question come to a head. Parliamentarians break into factions to argue that their city should be the permanent capital. The political manoeuvring would do Machiavelli proud. Months of shameless wrangling bring them no closer to a resolution, so Parliament petitions Queen Victoria, who selects Ottawa, which ignites more self-serving politics before the issue is finally resolved.

At the same time, Jed Jansen is coping with another surprising turn in his unpredictable life. Now in his late sixties, he's still trying to understand what's happening to him. A resolution of sorts presents itself. Or does it?

Sustainability?

apocalypse assail us on a daily basis, and we are exhorted to change our lifestyle and reduce our carbon footprint. I fear that this has become a case of "crying wolf" so often that we villagers no longer heed the pleas. Not many of us are willing to abandon our automobiles

and head off to the grocery store on our tandem bicycle — I salute those that walk (ride) the talk!

Is there cause for alarm? Along with another hundred people I had the good fortune to attend the October 19 meeting of the Mississippi Valley Field Naturalists (and by the way, this is a fantastic club — if you are not a member already, join now — find out more at mvfn.ca). Dr. Shelley Ball, a very enthusiastic and knowledgeable botanist and educator, led us on a tour of the Arctic and the Antarctic, featuring her spectacular photography. Who can resist gorgeous photos of a multitude of penguins? She termed these areas of the planet our "canary in the coal mine" as climate change affects them at a much faster rate than the rest of the globe. She ended with an impassioned plea for everyone to reduce their carbon footprint, noting that the rate at which we are gobbling up the Earth's resources requires the equivalent of 1.4 Earths (other sources estimate 1.6) — clearly not sustainable in the longer term!

It seems that the mantra has become "sustainable development." I often see the term "sustainable" used in the context of gardening and agriculture in a rather loose fashion. So I checked a few sources. One simple definition of sustainable development is: development that is capable of being maintained at a steady level without exhausting natural resources or causing severe ecological damage. Another source defines sustainability as "the ability to continue a defined behaviour indefinitely" and argues that a more complete definition includes environmental, economic, and social sustainability.

It is very difficult to deny that the road we have taken as a species does not lead to sustainability. What is the solution? I'm afraid that I have become very cynical about the efforts of highly-paid deep thinkers and political operatives as they consume inordinate amounts of jet fuel convening

Dire warnings of environmental for endless palavers in far-flung locales. It is easy to feel powerless and that our efforts are futile — the only solution I have come up with is to focus on very local projects.


> What does it mean in the context of our local gardening projects? Clearly small vegetable gardens are not sustainable. The produce we grow and consume depletes nutrients from the soil. We are obliged to bring in outside resources to maintain the fertility of the soil, whether it is a truckload of mushroom compost or composted manure from a friend's stable; it has to be transported in petroleum-guzzling vehicles.

> Some clues as to how to make gardening more sustainable may be found in the principles of permaculture: defined as "a system of agricultural and social design principles centered on simulating or directly utilizing the patterns and features observed in natural ecosystems". Some information on local initiatives may be found on the website of Permaculture Eastern Ontario, based in Perth < livinghearth.net>.

> To a very limited extent we have tried to incorporate some of those principles in local community gardens — one attempt was the construction of a berm around community gardens incorporating organic matter from clearing the site and then planting perennial fruit-bearing shrubs. Certainly every bit of compost we can produce in the garden reduces the amount that has to be trucked in — one initiative that I would like to see is the diversion of organic waste into municipal composting projects that then make the compost available to gardeners. I was very sorry to see Al Potvin's local leaf-composting project (in Almonte) come to an end.

> But getting back to the definition of sustainability, I believe that the only approach that works is a holistic one that includes environmental, economic and social sustainability. My focus is generally on food security and the importance of our local food producers, but it is evident to me that local food is closely tied to local community. Our local retailers are a critical element of that whole community. They provide the spaces where we all intersect, where we meet our neighbours. Without the "glue" provided by local artists, craftspeople and retailers, a sustainable community is illusory.

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
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Where Does that Name Come From?

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Species Spotlight: American Tree Sparrow

sparrow, the American tree sparrow is a consistent fixture here in Eastern Ontario year over year. Despite their name, these small sparrows are not particularly associated with trees, as their traditional nesting sites are often found in the northern tundra, known for its sparse offering of trees. One report even discovered them roosting under the cover of snow — burrowing below the surface to stay warm.

These ground-feeding birds are often sighted among flocks of dark-eyed juncos during the winter months, and they come equipped with a hefty appetite. American tree sparrows are often found foraging in the winter months in groups at backyard

bird feeders. Each day these sparrows need to take in roughly thirty percent of their body weight in food, and a similar percentage of water, to merely survive. Without proper food and water, these birds can lose up to one-fifth of their weight very quickly, and the unfortunate reality is that a day without proper nutrition often results in mortality. Another great reason to serve

high quality seed and provide a heated bird bath — this is sure to increase traffic to your yard this winter as you provide for our feathered friends on a daily basis, which is vital for their survival. Having just looked over this year's finch forecast, it seems that we may also see a good number of pine siskins and redpolls this year, and like the tree sparrows, these birds can eat their body weight in food each day.



A small ground-feeding sparrow that is often mistaken for the chipping sparrow, the American tree sparrow is noted for its brown-rust colouring and small round head. As far as sparrows go, the tree sparrow sports a relatively small bill with a long, thin tail in comparison to other species. I also find that because they are ground feeders their legs are comparatively longer. If your feeders are placed near shrubs or hedges you'll find these little sparrows scurrying around under cover of the shrubs. As with all species, identifying them becomes a "twitter, twitter, twe, twe, twe." easier once you can recognize their shape. To continue to improve, I suggest learning blacked-out silhouettes of birds before note pad ready to record what arrives and working on colour — most high-quality field guides include black bird silhouettes at the start of the book.

Tree sparrows' heads are recognizable by a rust-coloured cap and eye line, and a bicoloured bill with black on top and a pale

Commonly referred to as the winter yellow colour on the bottom. Their breasts are traditionally gray with a small dark spot right in the centre, and most birders confirm their ID from this marking. Also look for distinct white wing bars with a slight rust hue under the wings. These guys and the song sparrows are favourites of mine and a staple to us here in Eastern Ontario.

Where to Find Them

These high-mileage birds spend the summer months nesting far above the tree line in much of Canada's north and Alaska. During the winter, they migrate south in search of suitable forage and can be spotted throughout the entire country of Canada during transit, before eventually settling into their winter range in the southern regions of the country and northern portions of the United States.

These sparrows love open expanses such as fields and pastures where they will

> search out seeds from grasses, weeds, and other plants during the winter months. This is where I find our native grasses playing a huge role in not only feeding multiple species but also attracting them to our yard. These birds will also use a tray or a fly-through feeder to eat black oil sunflower seed and high protein millet, and you may find them under Nyjer seed tubes for-



I have had a native grasses area on my property for two years now, and as it has matured and produced more food I've been amazed at the amount of wildlife — birds, frogs, deer and more — that it attracts on a regular basis. It's in my plan to expand it over the coming years. Should you want to discuss seed sources of native grasses, wild native flowers and plants, let me know. I also have a few videos on the Gilligallou YouTube channel.



These busy little birds can also be quite vocal, particularly when feeding. They can often be heard twittering about while feeding in small flocks. The exchanges usually consist of small, warbling musical notes, but are also known for their songs of whistled notes lasting only a couple of seconds each in length. Some describe it as

It should be a great winter, so now is the time to prepare and get your binoculars and when. Please let me know when the tree sparrows show up at your place, along with all of the other winter birds. Enjoy!

Music Matter

The Great American Songbook

The term "Great American Songbetween the 1920s and 1950s, usually for Broadway musicals, other musical theatre, and film. Although

there is no official list of what tunes make up the Songbook, the one thing all of these songs have in common is that they have become jazz standards. The Songbook contains tunes by George Gershwin, Cole Porter, Irving Berlin, Jerome Kern, Harold Arlen, Johnny Mercer, Richard Rodgers, Duke Ellington, Hoagy Carmichael and many others.

Poll any jazz musician about their set lists, and tunes from the Songbook are sure to make up at least half (if not significantly more) of what they play. I am included in this camp.

Many contemporary rock and roll and popular music artists have rediscovered these tunes, or discovered them for the first time. Rod Stewart, Carly Simon, Ringo Starr, Queen Latifah, Boz Scaggs, Robbie Williams, Sting, Tom Waits, Pat Benatar, Rufus Wainwright, Bob Dylan, Lady Gaga and countless others have recorded albums of Songbook tunes. Almost universally, when asked why they chose to record them, their reply has been that the songs are so interesting to play and sing.

What makes the tunes in the Songbook so interesting for musicians? There are is just something so inherently satisfying in several important factors. Many music the timeless melodies and the interesting rock & roll. This new era was characterized by simple songs that anyone with a guitar and a bit of desire could play, because they contained three or four basic chords. Go back and listen to Buddy Holly or Bill Haley songs, and the same patterns appear all over the place. This simplicity was part of what made rock & roll so successful.

Most tunes in the Songbook are far book" refers to songs written more complex, both in terms of melody and harmony (the chords they use). A pop singer who is used to singing four-chord songs will always be challenged by the Great American Songbook. Looking at the way these writers put chords and melodies together is eye-opening. The artists I mentioned above have all made some version of this statement in interviews. There is just something tremendously satisfying about working on this material.

> I've had *All the Things You Are* by Jerome Kern and Oscar Hammerstein II stuck in my head for the last few days. This is a quintessential Songbook tune, that just about every jazz musician knows. It is an easy tune to listen to, but surprisingly complex when you have to sing or play it. I struggled with it when I first learned it, but it is now one of my favourites.

> Contemporary artists are breathing new life into these songs, and introducing them to a whole new generation of listeners. Tony Bennett did an incredible series of duets over two albums with some of the most famous contemporary artists in a variety of genres. They are a treat to listen to, especially if you watch the behind-the-scenes footage, where Tony shares his wisdom and insight prior to the recording sessions.

The Great American Songbook will continue to be great for a long, long time. There historians place the end of the Songbook chord progressions that make these tunes era as the early 1950s, with the advent of want to be played and listened to. If you aren't familiar with this music, do yourself a favour and start your musical journey. Please don't blame me if you become
